



Angela Labby In Top Ten Of Oregon Contestants For Betty Crocker Award

Angela Labby, senior at Nyssa high, is one of the top ten winners of Oregon in the Betty Crocker search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow. She competed with 6,860 other girls from 186 schools.

Two of these ten will be awarded college scholarships - the highest ranking girl \$1500 and the runner-up \$500. The other eight will receive honorable mention.

BONUS FOR WINNERS

In April the winners from each of the 50 states and the District of Columbia will be given an expense-paid tour of Washington, D. C. and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. In Williamsburg the four national winners will be selected on the basis of their original test scores plus personal observation and interviews while on tour. Their scholarships will be raised to \$5,000, \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

The original test, for which 630,564 senior girls in 15,116 high schools enrolled was constructed and graded by Science Research Associates of Chicago.
