WILLIAM GRIFFIN

Military services for Major William J. Griffin, 34, of Homedale were conducted by Mountain Home Air Force personnel Friday, March 21, 1969 at Dakan chapel in Caldwell. Interment followed at Wilder.

Major Griffin succumbed March 8 at a medical facility in Japan, where he was taken for treatment of injuries suffered in a crash of a Hercules C-130 over Taiwan. He was one of three crewmen injured in the crash, and the tenth member of the crew to die of injuries sustained in the accident.

The deceased was born Dec. 18, 1934 in Caldwell, attended Wilder and Homedale schools and was graduated in 1952 from Homedale high school. He was married July 1, 1954 to Melda Karen Strawn at Adrian.

Major Griffin was graduated from the University of Idaho in 1957 and went into the Air Force as a second lieutenant. He had been a member of the Reserve Officers Training Corps while at the U of I, and was ROTC commander in 1957.

He served in the Idaho Air National Guard for two years, studied navigation and was an electronics warfare officer, paratrooper and a jet pilot. He was awarded the Purple Heart medal in 1966 and received the Distinguished Flying Cross medal and the Presidential Unit Citation.

The deceased was a member of Phi Kappa Tau fraternity, Phi Delta Kappa Honor Society, Pershing Rifles, Scabbard and Blade at the U of I. He attended services at the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints.

In addition to his widow, Major Griffin is survived by three children, Bart Duane, Michael Shawn and Marcia Griffin, all residing with Mrs. Griffin's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lester Strawn of the Kingman Colony area near Adrian; his mother, Mrs. Pearl Horn and his step-father, C. C. Horn of Homedale; grandmothers, Mrs. Katie Cole of Homedale and Mrs. Livas Horn of Hood River, Ore.

Requiem Mass for Pablo Sillonis was celebrated Wednesday morning, March 26, 1969 at Our Lady of Good Counsel Catholic church at Mountain Home, with Father William F. Ordway as celebrant. Rosary was recited on the previous Tuesday evening at Smith Mortuary chapel and interment was made in the Mountain View cemetery.

Mr. Sillonis succumbed Saturday morning in a Boise rest home.

He was born April 26, 1881 in Yspaster, Viscaya, Spain; and he came to the United States and to Idaho in 1900.

The deceased worked as a sheepherder for the Archibald company and for many years worked for J. B. Aldecoa and son. He retired in 1954.

Mr. Sillonis married Julia Chacartegui on August 28, 1909 in Boise. She died in 1964. For the past several years, the deceased had resided in Boise.

He was a member of the Catholic church, the Euzkaldunak Basque association and La Asociacion de Socorros Mutuos.

Among survivors are four sons, Julio and John, both of Mountain Home, Richard of Glenns Ferry and Robert of Pomeroy, Wash.; a daughter, Mrs. Lydia Jausoro of Boise.

Also surviving is a brother, Augustin Sillonis of Big Bend area near Adrian; 11 grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

Mr. Towne succumbed Saturday in a Boise hospital, following an extended illness.

He was born Sept. 29, 1914 in Eagle and attended school there. He was graduated from St. Teresa's Academy and attended Boise Junior college, the University of Portland and the University of Idaho at Moscow. He was married on June 27, 1940 to Bernice Connell at Boise. He served in the Marine Corps during World War I.

During his lifetime, the deceased was in the real estate business and farmed in the Eagle area. He was a member of St. Mary's Catholic church at Eagle, county chairman for the Farm Bureau, a member of the Disabled American Veterans organization, Boise Elks lodge No. 310 and the Greater Boise Chamber of Commerce. He had also served as precinct committeeman for the Democratic party.

In addition to his widow, Mr. Towne is survived by three sons, John, Patrick and Christopher Towne, all of Eagle; three daughters, Mary Theresa Towne of San Francisco, Judy and Nancy Towne of Eagle.

Also surviving are three brothers, Herman Towne of Nyssa, Ernest and Vincent Towne of Boise. A brother, John preceded him in death.

It's Your Law!

Debts After Divorce

John and Mary were married for five years. During this period many debts were incurred, some of which were still unpaid when John deserted Mary.

Mary eventually sued for divorce, and in the decree that was granted her by the court there was a provision requiring John to pay all of the debts existing at the time the divorce action was started. One of these debts was for groceries John and Mary had used while still living together.

John left town and the creditors began making demand on Mary for payment of the debts. The grocery store started an action against Mary for a \$200 food bill. Mary resisted on the ground that the obligation was no longer hers since the court had decreed that John should pay the debts.

Was this a valid defense?

No. It was quite proper for the divorce court to require John to pay the debts, but that in no way injured the rights of those holding these claims. They were enforceable against Mary prior to the start of the divorce action and remained so after the divorce.

Groceries for a family are considered a necessity. For such necessities both the husband and wife are liable. This being so, this debt was a property right that the grocery store had against Mary and one that the divorce court by the decree of divorce could not destroy.

John of course may be in contempt of the court's order to pay the bills and he will owe Mary to the extent that she pays the obligation.

JUVENILE COURT?

When "Juvenile Court" is mentioned, many persons conjure up the scene of a wayward youth standing before the Judge awaiting punishment. But few persons realize that adults, as well, may be brought before the court, that some juveniles may be sent to regular courts for further prosecution and that not all juveniles in court are delinquents.

The philosophy of the Juvenile Court has been often stated as an investment in the court of the power and duty to do for a child what the parents should have done.

Since 1907, Juvenile Courts have been established in each county in Oregon.

Generally, the Juvenile Courts of Oregon have exclusive, original jurisdiction over those persons under 18 years of age who are traffic offenders, or are delinquent or dependent.

The Juvenile Court may decide that a juvenile should be dealt with as an adult for violation of a law. It then remands him to an adult criminal court. A child does not have to be "bad" to be affected by the Juvenile Court. A neglected, beaten or abandoned child will receive help from the court when the judge finds he is not getting proper care or treatment.

A Juvenile Court has jurisdiction to determine the custody of any child, either with a parent, relative, foster home or institution. It can compel support to be paid by a responsible person.

The Juvenile Court further attempts to rehabilitate youth or reunite a family. But it has the power to terminate the rights of a parent if unfit or if the parent has abandoned the child.

Juvenile Courts handle many cases and offer great help to Oregon's juveniles and families in trouble.
