WORK SMARTER - NOT HARDER

DON'T DISCARD WORNOUT sweaters for adults. Elaine Carlson, Oregon State University Extension clothing specialist, says these can often be cut down and made into children's sweaters.

If you have a favorite knit shell and want another one like it, make it yourself from knit fabric.

Miss Carlson tells how to do these jobs in her bulletin, "Sewing With Knits." Call your county Extension office for a free copy.

CLEANING BRICK IS A HARD job anyway you look at it. To remove the built-up black grime that accumulates on the outside of the fireplace, try one of these methods.

Scrub with strong tri-sodium phosphate solution and rinse thoroughly. You can buy this at almost any drug or grocery store. Be sure to put newspaper on the floor to protect it while you clean.

For stubborn smoke staining, use steel wool and scouring powder. Rinsing is important. If this doesn't do the job, get a 10 per cent solution of muriatic acid at the drug store. Wear rubber gloves while you scrub acid on with a brush.

Rinse well with clear water. Still another way is to use commercial paint cleaner. The instructions on the label should be followed.

SOME PEOPLE COULD SAY WHAT THEY THINK AND STILL BE SILENT

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CLOTHES WEAR OUT FASTER than they did a few years ago--or so some people say. If you feel that way, check up on your laundry methods.

If your washer has a control for adjusting the amount of water you use in the tub, maybe you are trying to wash with too little water in proportion to the quantity of cloths. There's more friction and wear and tear on clothes when the water level is low.

Another thing--a scanty amount of water puts extra strain on the motor to turn the agitator. You're likely to burn out the motor.

Another reason for excess wear on clothes is incorrect use of bleach. If liquid chlorine bleach is poured directly on clothes without diluting it, the fabric is weakened. Eventual holes appear.
