Hatfield, a Republican, said he wants a general consensus of views from Oregon voters on 10 of the "most important public issues currently before Congress."

Admittedly, all of these questions raise difficult and profound issues which cannot be finally decided by a simple "yes" or "no" answer.

Nevertheless, the response to this inquiry will be helpful to Sen. Hatfield when these issues come before the United States Senate for debate. Because Sen. Hatfield represents only Oregon, responses are requested from only residents of this state.
