

Vale Cindermen Take Six-Way Track Honors

The Vale Vikings were winners of a six-way invitational track and field event staged Thursday, April 24 on the Nyssa cinders, as a cold wind hampered nearly every event.

The Vikings picked up six firsts while compiling 65 points. Burns was a close second with 60½ followed by Kelly with 48½. Weiser was fourth with 42½ while Nyssa and Payette had 28 and 27½ points respectively to round out the field.

Weiser's Allan Judd tied his own record in the 880 run when he was clocked at 1:55.1. He turned in an identical time last year.

The first dispute arose in the medley relay where Vale was disqualified for having a runner outside of the exchange zone. The second incident came in the 880 relay where Kelly was disqualified for having a runner outside the exchange zone also, according to the officials.

Kelly's Larry Szurgot and Jim Smith of Payette were the only two-time winners. The swift Knight sprinter ran ahead of the crowd in the 100 yard dash with a 10.5 time, then beat everyone to the exit in the 220 at a time of 23 flat, just one-tenth of a second off the record 22.9 time.

Smith blasted over the 440 dash distance at a 52.7 pace and rocketed over the rod to win the high jump with a leap of five feet, eight inches.

Oregon Completes Study On State Water Needs Covering Next 100 Years

Governor Tom McCall announced today that the public presentation of the Oregon Ultimate Needs Water Study will be made Wednesday, May 7, at 2:00 p.m., in the Fine Arts auditorium at Willamette University.

The presentation will be made by the governor and the State Water Resources board which has conducted the study during the past four years to determine whether or not Oregon has a surplus of water to meet its future requirements. Oregon is the first Northwest state to complete such a far-reaching study of water needs, McCall said.

The study, authorized by the 1965 legislature, has been conducted by the Water Resources board to identify Oregon's ultimate or long-range water requirements for all beneficial uses including municipal, irrigation, power development, industrial, recreation, wildlife and fish life uses, water quality and navigation.

The board, with the assistance of contractors, has made projections of water needs as

related to water supply for each of the river basins of the state. Included have been determinations of the irrigable land, projections of major water-using industries, population projections to the year 2070 with the resultant water requirements for each of these uses as well as those of water quality, fisheries, recreation and navigation.

TO RECOMMEND ACTION

Following the board's presentation, the Governor will present his ideas pertaining to the material developed as well as recommendations for action to insure that Oregon's water is protected to meet the state's future requirements.

Both houses of the Oregon legislature will recess for the afternoon presentation.

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Rabies Clinics For Area Pets Set May 20 - 22

Rabies clinics for inoculation of dogs and cats will be held during a single week in May, it is announced by County Sanitarian John Glover, R. S.

The clinics will be from 6 to 9 p.m. at Ontario on Tuesday, May 20; Vale, May 21 and in Nyssa on Thursday, May 22.

The program is part of a weeklong campaign in Oregon to be certain that protection against rabies is kept at a high level. The clinics are sponsored locally by the Malheur County health department, in cooperation with the Oregon Veterinary Medical Association and the State Board of Health.

Others who will assist the clinics, at specific locations to be announced later, are the local Jaycees of Vale, Ontario and Nyssa.

Doctors at Treasure Valley Animal hospital and Ontario Veterinary clinic will vaccinate the pets. A \$2 fee for each animal will be charged to cover the costs of vaccines, equipment and tags.

According to state health officials, it is essential to keep pets safe from rabies because germs of this deadly disease are present in several types of small mammals in Oregon. Within the past nine years, 94 animals and one human case of rabies have been identified by the state public health laboratory.

Once rabies infection develops, the illness is always fatal, the health officials added.
