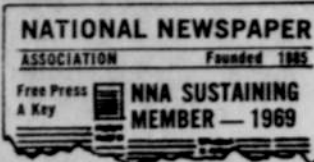

WORTH REPEATING

No matter what your chosen faith may be, we believe that the following quote taken from the McMinnville (Ore.) News-Register bears reprinting.

It was composed by the Reverend William E. Rose of the First Assembly of God: "Spying is risky, costly business. We were made newly aware of this in the Pueblo incident and now at even greater loss in terms of lives with the downing of the U. S. intelligence plane off Korean waters."

"I've been asked 'How does a Christian view this matter, one brother spying on another?'"

"Obviously the relationship of Christian and true brotherhood would make incidents like this totally unnecessary. But the problem arises in that the world is not Christian. The nations are not Christian and do not operate on the principles that make for peace."

"Some cry for us to stop such spying. To do so would be national catastrophe. You can't force Christian principles (and that is what all the true principles of brotherhood are) on Un-Christian people. My point is simply this: the business of the Christian Church is not to stop the spying nor the wars nor the vice and crime. In short it is not to stop anything but to start an inward revolution."

"The gospel is the good news of a person and work that unites man with God and man with man in a heart-to-heart experience. To teach brotherhood is not enough. We have to be made brothers inwardly first."

"We need an inward revolution, a revolution of love. As long as the bulk of the world's leadership seeks military might as a means for peace, there will necessarily have to be intelligence operations spying on one another."

"There is great need for the Christian Church to rise to the crisis of the hour and proclaim the good news of a better way. This better way is found not only in the principles of Christianity, but also in the person, Christ, who said, 'I am the way, the truth, and the life.'"

Shouldn't all of us seek the inward revolution of which Mr. Rose speaks? Wouldn't it be a better world for all?"

OBITUARIES

MILDRED RENSTROM

Funeral services for Mrs. Mildred (Mickey) Renstrom were conducted at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, May 5, 1969 at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. J. D. Crego of Nyssa United Methodist church.

Mrs. Renstrom succumbed on the previous Thursday at a hospital in Nampa, following an extended illness.

She was born June 2, 1905 at Bolivar, Mo., a daughter of W. C. and Irma Myers. At an early age, she moved with her parents to Idaho, settling in Deer Flat, south of Nampa. The deceased was graduated from Nampa high school in 1924, after which she attended Washington State college at Pullman, graduating in 1928. She then spent a year in Alaska after which she was a physical education instructor for two years in Seattle.

On Feb. 12, 1931, she was married to Kenneth S. Renstrom at Weiser, and they moved to Nyssa in 1944. Mrs. Renstrom taught school in Apple Valley for two years, before joining the staff at Nyssa junior high school where she was still teaching until the start of a serious illness in 1968.

The deceased was a charter member of Nyssa Eagles auxiliary No. 2134 and served as the organization's first president. She was worthy matron of Order Of Eastern Star, Golden Rule chapter No. 131 in 1954 and at one time served as president of the Nyssa Education association.

Mrs. Renstrom is survived by a daughter, Ann Renstrom at Fairview home in Salem; her mother, Mrs. Irma Myers of Nyssa; and a brother, Howard W. Myers of Cape Coral, Fla. Mr. Renstrom died on Sept. 22, 1966.

Members of the Eagles auxiliary were in charge of ritualistic services at Lienkaemper chapel, with members of OES Golden Rule chapter conducting committal rites at the Nyssa cemetery.

IVA DEWEY

Funeral rites for Former Nyssan Mrs. Iva (Edd) Dewey, 84, were conducted Friday, May 2, 1969 at Richland, Wash.

Mrs. Dewey succumbed Tuesday morning at Richland, where she was residing with a daughter, Mrs. Everett Matlock.

The deceased was a charter member of Nyssa Christian church. Her husband died several years ago.

Among survivors are five sons, Bob and John of Sutherland, Ore., Edwin in Nebraska, and Frank of Baker and Floyd Dewey in Washington state; two daughters, Mrs. Matlock of Richland and Mrs. Gilbert (Audrey) Henry in California.

LOURA SMITH

Final rites for Mrs. Loura Rose Smith, 93, will be conducted at 2 o'clock this afternoon, May 8, 1969 at Lienkaemper chapel, with the Rev. Arthur Skogan officiating. Interment will be made in the Owyhee cemetery.

Mrs. Smith, a longtime resident of the Adrian-Owyhee area, succumbed Sunday at Malheur Memorial nursing home in Nyssa.

She was born Feb. 10, 1876 at Fredonia, Kans., a daughter of James Sterling and Harriet Vaughn Pinkston. The family moved to the Cherokee Strip in Oklahoma when she was two years old, then lived in Arkansas, again in Kansas, leaving the Sunflower state in April 1884 by covered wagon to start west. They arrived at the Owyhee river in mid-July that year.

They settled in the Owyhee area, and on Dec. 18, 1891 Loura Pinkston was married to Willie Smith.

On Feb. 10, 1967, her 91st birthday anniversary, Mrs. Smith was honored by relatives and friends at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Charlotte McGinnis in Adrian. In the Journal issues of March 9 and May 11 that same year, a 'This Is Your Life' story gave a history of the lives of Mrs. Smith and members of her family.

The deceased is survived by one son, Cecil Smith of Adrian, a daughter, Mrs. McGinnis, also of Adrian; nine grandchildren and 16 great-grandchildren.

She was preceded in death by her husband on July 1, 1947 and two sons, Claude and Leonard.

In addition to Mr. Stephen, the deceased is survived by two children, Michael Lee and Patricia Ann, all of the home in rural Nyssa.

Other survivors include her mother, Mrs. Evelyn Jantzen; two brothers, Frank and Larry Jantzen; three sisters, Mrs. Alice Taylor, Terry Lynn and Janette Jantzen, all of Vale.

Also surviving are her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Ben Davis of Eden, Idaho and Mrs. Agnes Jantzen of Inola, Okla.
