The regular public hearing to establish the 1969 big game regulations will be held in Portland on May 24, with final regulations to be adopted on June 7. Upland game and waterfowl regulations will be set in early August.

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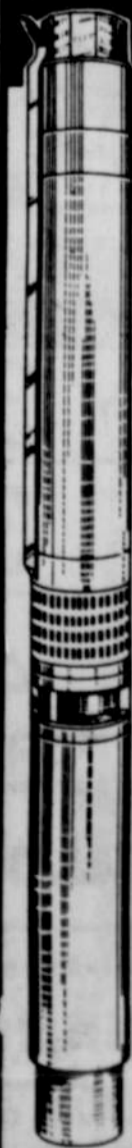
