Malheur ASCS Schedules Range Project Renewal

Blaine Girvin, chairman of the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service, has announced that the continuation of a special range rehabilitation project started last year in Malheur County under the agricultural conservation program is about to get underway for 1969.

The project was instigated in 1968 through a cooperative effort of the agencies of the Department of Agriculture in Malheur County.

The costs involved in rehabilitating the rangeland are shared with individual rangeland owners by federal funds administered through the ASCS.

Emphasis has been given to the control of sagebrush by aerial application of chemicals, and reseeding of grasses when native grass stands are inadequate. Weather is an important factor in chemical control of sagebrush and soil moisture is carefully checked by county agent George Bain before approval is made to spray a given area.

Special consideration and attention is given to preservation of adequate wildlife habitats throughout these rangeland areas.

There were 33,000 acres sprayed under the project in 1968, and this year, with more favorable weather, it is anticipated that over 50,000 acres will be sprayed, Girvin said. Nearly 10,000 acres will be reseeded.

Rangemen are praising the project, according to Girvin. By this coordinated effort in combining the acreage into one large project, costs have been

reduced to approximately \$1.67 per acre, he said.

This, shared on a 50-50 basis, costs the rangeland about 80 cents per acre. Cattlemen say it is the cheapest feed they can buy, since in most cases, it more than doubles the carrying capacity of their ranges.

The Ontario Flight Service has been awarded the contract for spray application, and it is anticipated that spraying will get underway soon.

Haines Resident Named To Parks, Recreation Board

The Oregon State Highway Commission recently announced the appointment of Roger Loennig of Haines to the nine-member Parks and Recreation Advisory Committee. The four-year term is effective May 27, 1969.

Loennig represents the area in the State Highway Department's Division 5 in Eastern Oregon, which covers approximately one-third of the state. According to the Commission's resolution, one or more members are appointed from each of the five numbered State Highway divisions.

Loennig is a successful farmer in the Muddy Creek area. He was born in Haines in 1909 but lived most of his life in Baker. He is chairman of the rural school board, director of the Sheriff's Air Posse, and Head of Search and Rescue, Oregon State Board of Aeronautics, 18th District. His main interests are public school problems and aviation.

The Commission also reappointed Donald McGregor of Grants Pass and Eric Allen, Jr., of Medford to four-year terms on the advisory committee.

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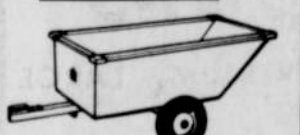
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
