Graveside services for Herbert Delancey Lackey, 73, of Ontario, will be conducted at 10 a.m. Friday, May 16, 1969 at the Evergreen cemetery under direction of Ontario Chapel of the Roses. Officiating will be the Rev. Edward McIndoo, pastor of the Ontario First Christian church.

Mr. Lackey succumbed the previous Monday in an Ontario nursing home.

of the college and that it was his understanding that 1/3 the cost was to be borne by the students, 1/3 by local taxes and the other third from state, federal and other sources. And that if his arithmetic was right students were not paying their third.

And, if it was supposed to be a COMMUNITY college, why was it necessary to have a \$40,000 Travel Budget when most students lived within a short distance of the school?

And how could the board know what the financial condition of the school was when the audit required by law had not been made? And why athletic recruiting done in Chicago?

Skinner answered part of these and other questions tossed at him when his answers brought on other questions. He doubted that local taxes was driving industry away - that it was more likely state. He never answered about the travel expense but said that to his knowledge that no recruiting of athletes in Chicago had ever taken place.

While on the athletic portion of the discussion, Skinner said the entire athletic program budgeted (\$31,000) was supported and paid for with student fees. And that an athlete desiring to attend school was treated just the same as a music student making inquiries.

MORE QUESTIONS

Journal Editor Ted Brammer responded to Skinner's statement that he did not like the way Nyssans voted on the college budget and that the college had lost students due to the defeat of it.

Brammer told him that the college was not alone in having budget troubles -- that it also existed in the public schools of Oregon, that according to figures of the Oregon Board of Education 80 percent of the total students of the state attended schools that defeated their budgets on May 5. And, he inquired as to where the disgruntled students would go and not face similar financial troubles. He also called attention to the economical factors involved when Nyssa voted, saying, "If the college was located in Nyssa or Vale you would probably find as high a percentage of voters against it as now in Nyssa. It is the biggest industry in Ontario. President Skinner agreed with this.

Gene Stunz asked again Jackson's question pertaining to a lack of audit as required by law. Skinner explained that the business manager previously serving was not capable of keeping track of the records, that Auditor John Fowler had found it necessary to reconstruct many of the financial dealings and that bills were paid that were more than two years old. He also said that Mr. Fowler's health had been another factor in the delay.

Many other questions of a minor nature were asked and answered but many not due to the time element.

Expressions, from some in attendance, after the meeting was that it was most enlightening and interesting and should have been heard by everyone in the county.

Skinner, Rinehart, and Ace Lloyd (a member of the budget board) acknowledged that this

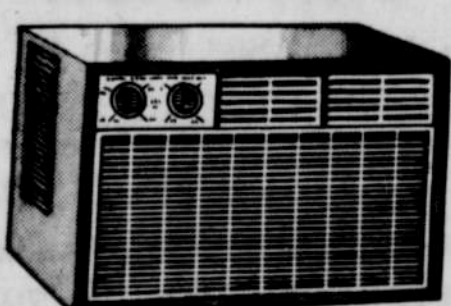
