

F. Smith said Monday that the A PUBLIC HEARING was city of Nyssa will receive an at 2 P. M. on Supplemental approves a plan adopted by the Court. Ways and Means Committee.

Smith said he supports a revised liquor revenue distribution formula which would boost the share of revenues that cities receive from 14 to 20 per cent.

Legislative approval of the plan, he said, would result in an additional \$4 million revenue to hard-pressed city governments during the next biennium.

Smith said that Nyssa would receive \$20,251 during the next two years under the present formula. If the revised formula is adopted, the city would receive \$28,930.

Smith said that the share received by Malheur County will remain at its present percentage. The increase for cities will result in a reduction in revenue to state government.
