Saturday card parties regularly held at 8 p. m. at the IOOF hall in Nyssa have been changed to 8:30 p. m. on the same days.

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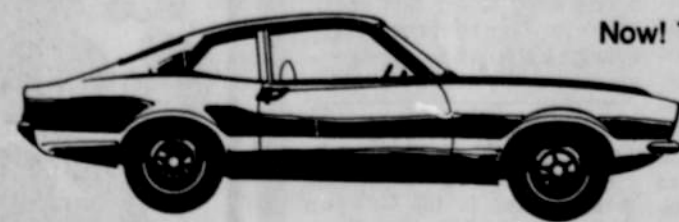
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
