## ROY C. POUNDS

Funeral services for Roy Clark Pounds were conducted at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, May 26, 1969 at Lienkaemper Chapel. Officiating was the Rev. J. W. Dotson of the Missionary Baptist church.

Mr. Pounds succumbed on the previous Friday at the Nyssa hospital following an extended illness. He was born Feb. 5, 1903, at Sawyer, N. D. He came to this area with his parents in 1909 and attended Nyssa schools.

Prior to operating a barber-shop in Adrian, the deceased had operated barber, cleaning and grocery firms in Nyssa since 1929.

On July 7, 1927, he was married to Hazel Beam at Baker. In addition to his widow of the home, Mr. Pounds is survived by a son, Dick Pounds of Nyssa; one daughter, Mrs. Peggy Norman of Ephrata, Wash.; and nine grandchildren.

Other survivors include two brothers, Byron Pounds of Phoenix, Ariz., and Glen Pounds of Adrian; three sisters, Mrs. Edith Duncan of Coeur d'Alene, Mrs. Nellie Megordan of Yakima, Wash., and Mrs. Gertrude Matheny of King City, Calif. Interment was made in the Nyssa cemetery under direction of Lienkaemper chapel.

But it also contained a message for any faculty or students who might be prone to participate in the type of destructive or violent tactics which have crippled campuses in other states. The report told these dissident radicals, in very blunt language, to shape up or ship out.

## WELFARE A FAILURE

Public welfare programs also came under close scrutiny during this session, and the majority feeling seemed to be that these programs have been colossal failures.

As presently constituted, welfare's greatest flaw and weakness is that it perpetuates poverty for the recipients. Consequently, we have an institution of poverty, and some of those on welfare are third generation families who live on the public dole.

This finding resulted in an innovative approach which takes into consideration that the basic goal of public welfare should be to help every person move as far toward independent living as his capacity permits.

Under this new approach, training, education and work experience programs will be

employed in an attempt to get people off the welfare rolls and to make them productive members of society once again.

Finally, probably the most significant area of this new spirit of innovation and initiative was demonstrated by the massive governmental reorganization program which obtained the approval of both Senate and House.

Observers who are trying to understand this sudden surge to a remodeling and streamlining of governmental structure must realize that legislators are saying that the old ways of doing things are simply not good enough any more.

They are saying that we have reached the point when we need better government—not more government—if we are to cope with problems as they are now and are likely to become in the future.

This was easily the most significant trend established by the 1969 Legislature, and citizens can expect this new spirit to continue through the biennium and into the next session.

## Nyssa School Budget Passed

With only about one third of eligible voters turning out Friday Nyssa School District's budget was approved by a 19 vote margin.

Voting Yes to approve the \$78,000 figure outside the 6% limitation were 287 while the No vote was 268.

This was the first election for the district on the budget, which called for \$1300 less taxes than in the current year.

## Suit Filed Against Three Nyssa Coaches

Three athletic coaches at Nyssa high school have been named defendants in a battery complaint filed this week in Malheur County Circuit Court at Vale.

Lloyd Tankersly, Ontario filed the battery complaint against Paul Schaffeld, Henry Mendazona and Thomas Neel, all of Nyssa.

In the complaint he alleges that on May 14 the three coaches, acting jointly and together, unlawfully and violently removed him from his seat at the Two Boys Restaurant in Ontario, threw him to the floor and beat him about the head, neck and shoulders.

Tankersly stated in the complaint that he was injured and the scuffle aggravated a previously existing spinal disease.

He is seeking a judgment of \$7,500 general damages, \$102 medical expenses and punitive damages of \$10,000 for a total of \$17,602 damages.

Although unpaid bills are by no means rare, they are never-theless considered collectors' items.
