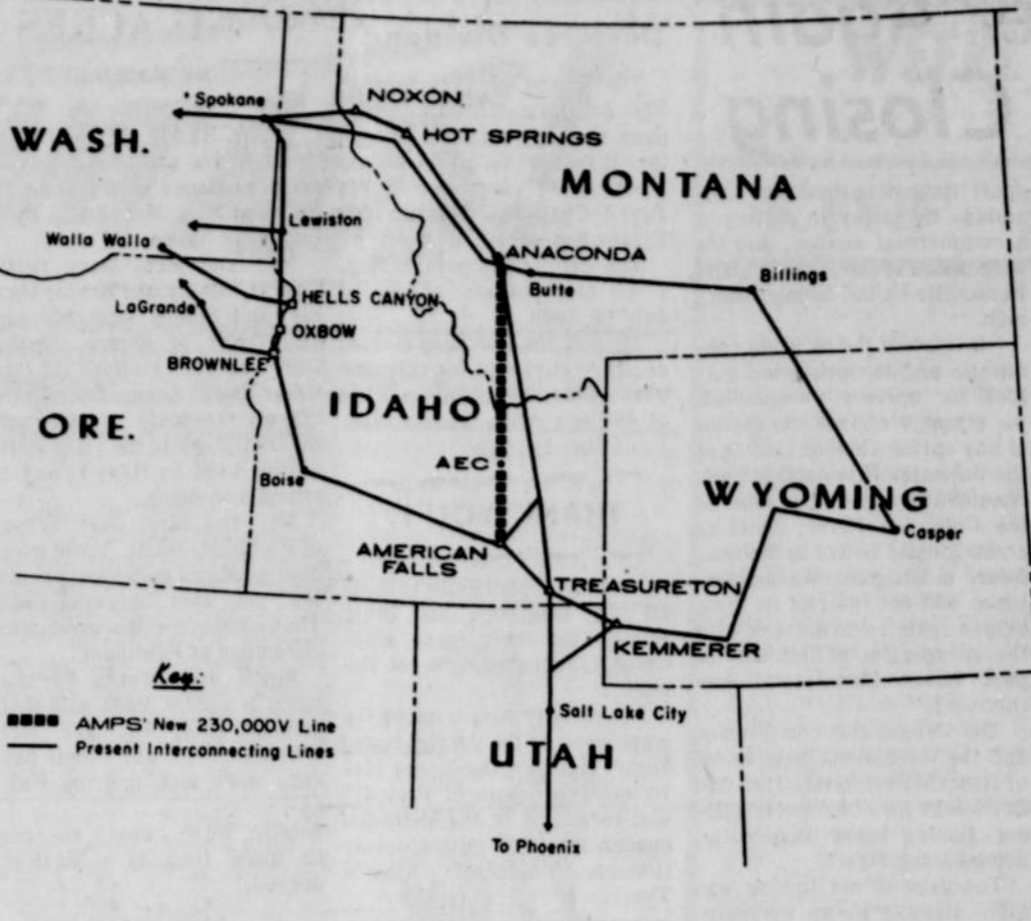

MAP SHOWS SECTION OF NEW 230,000-volt transmission line Idaho Power Company will build as one of final links in additional facility extending 565 miles between Noxon and Kemmerer to interconnect five Northwest utilities. Idaho Power plans to start work June 1 on its 60-mile section from American Falls to Scoville, near Atomic Energy Commission's testing station. Five companies will operate line as coordinating group called AMPS (Associated Mountain Power Suppliers).

**IDAHO POWER STARTS ON FINAL SECTIONS OF CONNECTING LINES**

Idaho Power Company will start construction June 1 on one of the final sections in a 565-mile, high-voltage transmission line to maintain maximum service reliability and increase capacity for power exchanges among five Northwest utilities, it was announced Wednesday.

Company president Albert Carlsen said the section of line, estimated to cost \$2.2 million, will extend about 60 miles between Idaho Power's Brady substation at American Falls and Scoville, near the Atomic Energy Commission testing station.

The utility's project is part of a 230,000-volt line being built jointly by Idaho Power and four neighboring companies at an estimated cost of \$21 million from the Noxon hydro-electric plant in western Montana to the Naughton steam plant near Kemmerer, Wyoming.

Construction of two other sections also is being started, with Utah Power & Light Company building between Scoville and the Montana border, and Montana Power Company building between the border and Anaconda.

The remaining sections at both ends of the heavy-duty carrier already have been completed by Utah Power and Washington Water Power Company. Carlsen said the new line will provide "important" service benefits for more than 1 million electric consumers in the intermountain region, including those supplied by Idaho Power.

"It will enable Idaho Power to maintain an already-high level of service reliability for our customers, who have had electricity available to them more than 99% of the time in the last five years," he said.

"The line, by providing additional transmission interconnections between the five companies, will help us to achieve maximum coordination of operations to meet peak requirements, to make more efficient use of power resources and to build larger, more efficient generating plants at lower unit costs."

Carlsen pointed out that the line will be an additional means of delivering electricity to Idaho Power's system from the neighboring utilities while the company is planning and building its own proposed steam plant.

Idaho Power and the four other utilities, which also include Pacific Power & Light Company, will operate the new line as a coordinating group known as AMPS (Associated Mountain Power Suppliers). Each company builds and owns the section in its service area, but shares in the annual costs of the joint facilities and has proportionate transmission rights.

J. F. Servis, Idaho Power superintendent of engineering and construction, said the com-

pany has awarded a contract to Jelco, Inc., of Salt Lake City, for construction of its section of the line.

He said more than 50 men are expected to be at work on the project at its peak this summer.
