He opened his statement with, "Two years ago we promised to operate the college in a business-like manner, and we think we have. The budget may be a different matter but we ARE OPERATING PROPERLY."

After noting how different it was from the other public hearing, when three outside people were present, he asked for any comments or criticisms from the floor. A short period of silence greeted him, and smiling, he said, "Well, what are your questions then?"

ADRIAN S.D. MAKES BUDGET CHANGES FOR JUNE 27 ELECTION

The Adrian School District Board along with members of the budget board met on June 10th and reduced the budget levy to be voted upon in an election set for June 27, 1969. The total amount to be voted upon will be \$251,506.32, down from \$269,813.50. The following reductions and or additions were made.

- Reductions to the levy were made by:
1. Dropping the Drivers Education Program \$ 910.00
 2. Reducing the salary accounts 9200.00
 3. Receipt of more State Basic funds 7597.00
 4. Dropping a part of school bus payment 2600.00

Additions to the budget were:

1. Well and roof expense 1000.00
2. Hot lunch fund 1000.00 (Covering cut in food previously furnished by Fed. agency).

TVCC Board Cuts Budget \$53,078 For Third Vote; Election Tuesday, June 24

Electors in the Treasure Valley Community College district will vote for the third time, Tuesday, June 24, on a budget for the ensuing year.

The revised figures are \$53,078 lower than those in the budgets failing on the first two tries. The amount to be approved by the voters is \$323,304, as the college does not have a tax base and the entire amount must be approved.

County Budget Hearing Set In Court House June 26; Tax Levy Lowered \$32,000

A public hearing on the county budget is scheduled for 2 p.m. Thursday, June 26, in the Court House in Vale. At this time any person may appear to discuss the document or any part of it.

The total taxes to be levied are well within the six percent limitation, hence are not subject to voter approval. But this is the time and place for taxpayers to get desired information and be heard on any changes they may desire.

The budget document is carried for the first time in all three county papers. This enables all voters to study the figures without the necessity of making a trip to Vale and buying individual copies at \$1.00 each.

TAX LEVY DOWN \$32,000

The total taxes to be levied are down \$32,000 from last year (\$629,713 to \$597,463). The county judge and commissioners are not implying that they can operate this much lower than last year. It is that the state is taking over practically all of the cost of the welfare program effective July 1, 1969. This item alone cuts off about \$85,000. The amount of this item last year was \$103,000 but the county is required by law to pay the cost of maintaining foster homes and paying any previous deficits that may have occurred in the past two years. \$18,800 has been estimated to cover the latter cost.

INCREASE NOTED

The proposed document increases the county road fund from \$51,000 during the current year to \$99,000.

The next largest increases are a five percent raise for salaries, \$16,000 for personnel at the Malheur Nursing home to making pay commensurate with that paid at the Presbyterian Nursing home of Ontario and the Malheur Memorial hospital in Nyssa.

Another sizable raise is under the Abundant Food program. There is an \$8,000 raise on freight and supplies. This program is provided for people with certain low incomes and now provides 27 different items, where it only provided 14 four years ago, according to County Auditor Henry Hartwell. Many of these, as Hartwell pointed out, are people other than those on welfare, whom the federal government assumes need additional help.

DETAILED BY DEPTS.

The document is well detailed by departments, and with the exception of not showing what individuals may draw in salaries, shows practically all changes anticipated.

For those who have little experience in reading budgets, it is suggested that they first study the financial summary at the top of the first page.

Plans Progress For Miss Oregon Rodeo Contest

Plans are progressing for the Miss Rodeo Oregon contest to be held July 4-5 in Vale, along with the community's annual July 4 Rodeo. Last year was the first time in several years that Oregon has had such a contest.

Girls who are current queens of rodeos and horse shows in Oregon, and between the ages of 18 and 24 years are eligible to compete, with the winner competing in the Miss Rodeo America contest at Las Vegas, November.

Rodeo and horse show officials were contacted about the contest. However, any girl qualifying and wishing to compete may do so by contacting Bill Evins, contest director, Vale before June 28. A \$25 entry fee is being charged to offset the cost of sending the queen to the national contest.

Several beautiful prizes and trophies will be awarded the queen and her court with the queen receiving a saddle. During the contest the girls will be judged on personality, personal appearance and horsemanship. Cowboys will be competing in a rodeo. Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights in Shamrock Arena and on Thursday night the famous suicide race off Vale Butte will be held. It promises to be a big weekend for contestants and spectators alike.

And, as the second step, check the next column (General Co. Fund Resources) and learn where the money for operation of the county comes from, and, Third, check the following Recap Fund to find out in what departments the money is spent. This section only gives the total for each department but they follow in order throughout the balance of the document. The cost of the County Court is shown as the top figure in this group and it is the first underneath -- showing how the money is spent.

CUT AND FILE

It is suggested that the budget be cut from the paper and filed for ready reference. The County court may make minor changes following the budget hearing but as a whole it will be complete and a ready source for information.

FLAG DAY PARADE

A flag day parade, sponsored by Cub Scout Pack 450 will be staged Saturday in downtown Nyssa. Starting time is 10 a.m., with participants meeting at 9 o'clock on the elementary school grounds at the 'Y'. The route will be down Main street, probably to First street, then south.

Leading the parade will be members of the Malheur County Sheriff's Posse. Others marching will be members of the Civil Air Patrol, the Nyssa Jaycees, area Girl and Boy Scouts.

All area residents are urged to show their patriotism by participating in the parade or being on hand to honor this country's symbol of freedom.

Miss Fujishin, co-valedictorian of the Adrian high school graduating class, with a grade point average of 3.991, has been awarded one of 15 undergraduate scholarships of the National Japanese American Citizens League.
