GOV. M'CALL TELLS ULTIMATE DEMANDS ON OREGON WATER

Gov. Tom McCall recently unveiled the ultimate needs study on Oregon's water resources and 100-year needs, pointing first to the fact that Oregon's water resources in-state are short of projected needs.

The study, authorized by the 1965 Legislature, and costing in excess of \$800,000, details the projected water needs for the state in the year 2070 from all standpoints - industrial, irrigation, recreation, population, fish and wildlife, in-stream flow demands and water quality.

"ONE OF THE most essential conclusions of the report stresses that the potentials for water-use in Oregon exceed the supply that originates in our state," McCall said, in urging immediate action in establishing water allocation compacts or contracts with the other states of the Columbia Basin. "It is essential that this be done," McCall pointed out "for planning will be meaningless and development impotent if water is not available."

The governor also commented on the "striking similarity of our position to that of the Southwest" in being a water-short state. He pointed out, however, that "Fortunately, the water is poor, but nevertheless, it comes from far distances."

The report shows that there are 757,200 irrigable acres in the Malheur watershed and 1,124,400 acres in the Owyhee watershed.

PROJECTED population for Malheur County by 2070 was set at 50,000 and for Owyhee, 7,500. The study was presented to the public, legislators and visitors from many states at a meeting this week at Willamette University. Preceding McCall's summation, the Water Resources Board, with Donel

It's Your Law!

Partnership Agreement

Sam and Fred had been friends for some time. Sam had experience in the clothing business. He wanted to open a store of his own but did not have enough capital. So Sam approached Fred, who agreed to match the amount of money Sam was able to raise. The business was to be located in a building which Fred owned. Sam was to run the business, Fred to receive one-half the profits.

After the store had been in operation for some time, Fred learned that Sam, the store manager, had been having a difficult time and was heavily in debt. Fred had previously taken no notice of Sam's operation of the store and did not know of Sam's difficulties until creditors started to press Fred for payment of the bills Sam had incurred. Sam being hopelessly in debt finally closed the store and started looking for a job.

Fred refused to pay the bills Sam had incurred since he had no part in the operation of the business but only put up part of the money which had already been lost. Could Fred refuse to pay the debts on good ground?

The answer is no. By their informal agreement Sam and Fred became partners, even though Fred had no part in the operation of the store. All partners are liable for the store's debts.

Through a written limited partnership agreement that was properly drawn, executed, and filed, however, Fred could have limited his liability to the amount of money he originally invested in the partnership. (Oregon lawyers offer this column as a public service. No person should apply or interpret any law without the aid of an attorney who is completely advised of the facts involved. Even a slight variance in fact may change the application of the law.)

A reception will follow commencement ceremonies.

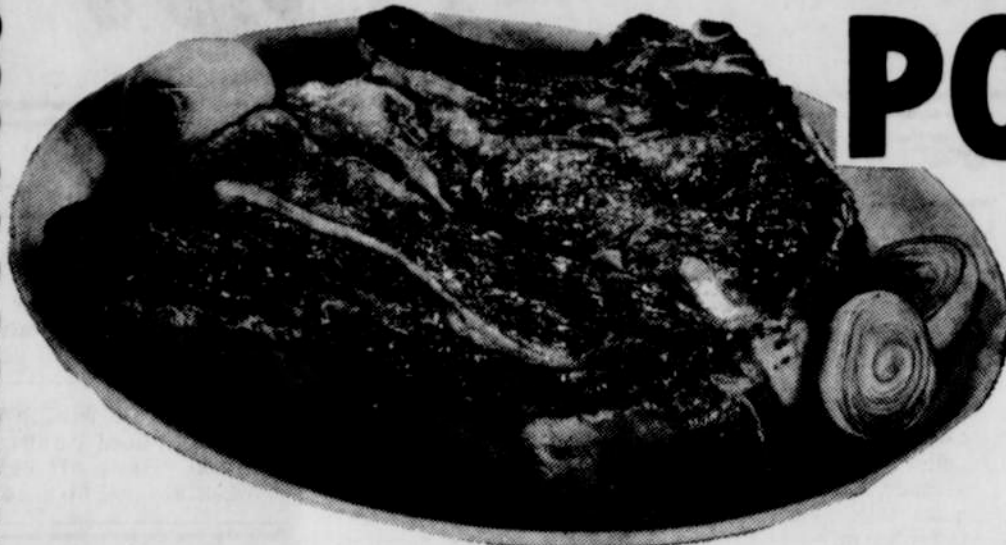
