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NEW MIGRANT AID IN ONTARIO AREA

An experimental and demonstration project is now underway at Ontario, under the direction of J. Nelson Miller, Rural Manpower Service, Department of Employment and Dale Appleton, manager, Ontario office, Department of Employment. The project is designed to determine the needs and provide aid to 50 migrant families selected by the Texas Employment commission and assigned to Oregon, the employing state.

The program will provide the migrants a continuity of services in Texas and throughout their migrant trek. The project will be extended as far as possible to other migrant and ex-migrant families in the area. They will be assisted in availing themselves of the full range of community services necessary to better qualify them for more continuous employment.

Services will include basic vocational training, mobility, job development and placement and health and welfare. Those interested in relocating in Oregon or other demand states where unfilled job opportunities exist will be assisted in doing so. Community orientation will be provided and individual participation in community activities will be encouraged to help assure community acceptance.

The staff, which will carry out the project, in the Ontario area includes Joaquin Hernandez counselor; Rosa Romero, clerk - typist; and Rural Outreach Interviews Mrs. Mary Thiel, former legal secretary and employee of Amalgamated Sugar Co. and Alfonso Canales, ex-Marine sergeant who saw service in Vietnam. Their office at present is in the Ontario office of the Department of Employment.
