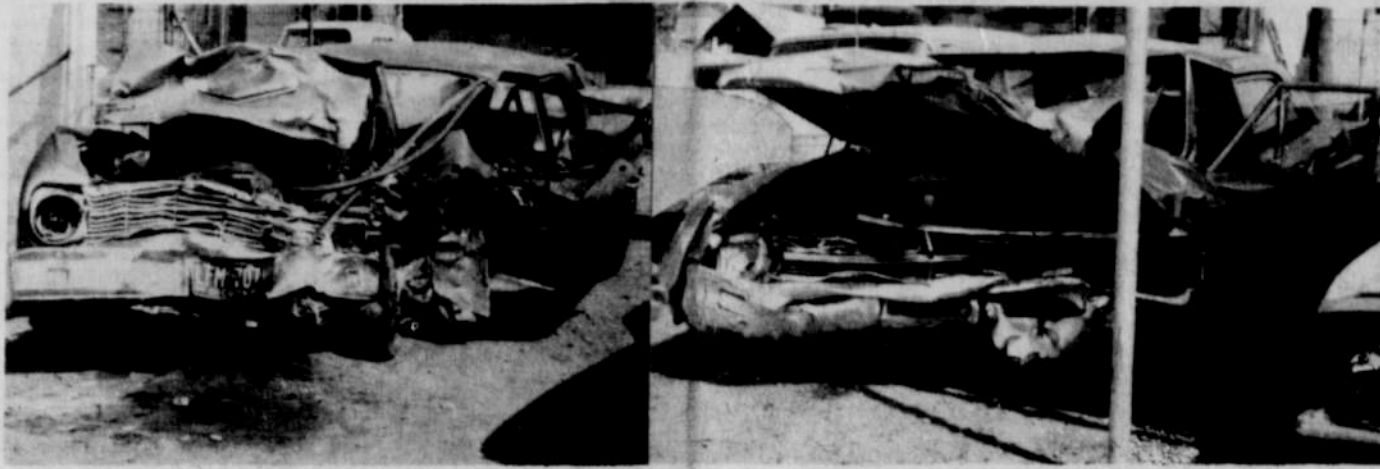

HEAD-ON COLLISION KILLS TWO NEAR NYSSA

Both drivers were killed, and two small children injured, when their vehicles collided almost head-on one mile north of Nyssa at 5:47 Tuesday afternoon.

Marilyn Anne Clarkson, 22, Nyssa, headed north on Highway 20-26-201, driving a 1966 Buick car died at the scene of the accident. Douglas Carl Hoden, 22, Parma Route 3, headed south in a 1963 Falcon car survived the crash but died enroute to a Boise hospital in a Malheur Memorial hospital ambulance.

Passengers in the Clarkson car were her nephew and niece, Rodney Dale and Delena DeeAnn Cook, children of Mr. and Mrs.

Enos Neil Cook, Ontario, Route 1. They were taken to the Malheur Memorial hospital in Nyssa for treatment of lacerations and bruises.

Miss Clarkson is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carl Clarkson, 711 Thompson, Nyssa. Hoden is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Chet Hoden of Reno, Nev. Both victims were single.

Oregon State Police records show that it "appeared the car driven by Miss Clarkson crossed the center line hitting the Hoden car."

Bodies of both were at Lienkaemper Funeral Home in Nyssa with funeral arrangements pending at Journal press-time Wednesday afternoon.

TOTAL SEWAGE TREATMENT PLANT PLANNED FOR NYSSA; AS DIRECTED BY THE STATE

In line with the national emphasis on stream pollution control, and I am sure all of us in the West are quite conscious of water and conservation of water. The City of Nyssa will have to modify and increase the character of sewage treatment (which sewage is discharged into the Snake River). This is also in line with the recommendation made by the Engineers in their study of 1959 and 1960.

Presently the plant is a primary treating plant and the effluent or the discharge waste are only partially treated as to bacteria. To produce an acceptable waste discharge we will have to resort to a complete treating plant.

I have made preliminary design studies and submitted same to the Oregon State Board of Health for comments. A tentative estimate would put the cost of these improvements at less than \$100,000 dollars.

Postage Costs To Rise July 1

An "inherited" postal deficit of \$1.2 billion is responsible for the proposals to raise the postage bill for residents of Nyssa, Postmaster Dail said today. Mr. Dail said he had been advised by Postmaster General Winton M. Blount in Washington, D. C. that the record \$1.2 billion 1970 deficit compelled President Nixon to seek Postage rate increases. Without higher rates the Department will be left with a staggering deficit that would become an added tax burden.

In addition to increasing letter mail from 6 cents to 7 cents, as proposed by the Johnson Administration, President Nixon also asked that second and third-class mailers help reduce the large postal deficit, which would otherwise be paid by the taxpayers, the Postmaster said.

For Bulk third-class mail and most magazines and newspapers, the rates would be increased 16 percent to 20 percent above today's levels, he noted. These percentages include rate hikes already scheduled by previous action of Congress.

The President's recommended increase will reduce the 1970 Postal deficit by more than \$600 million.

Nyssa school board members studied the effect of an additional amount of money from the State Department of Education available for Nyssa schools at their regular meeting Wednesday evening. Clerk Dirick Nedry reported that the Basic School Appropriation has been increased as result of legislative action, and Nyssa will receive an additional \$30,209.65 in Basic School Support money. This will raise the appropriation to \$254,708.65 for the 1969-70 school year.

The net effect of this, Nedry said, will be to reduce taxes in the Nyssa School District from \$582,861.16 down to \$550,751.51, a reduction of \$32,109.65. It will also reduce the amount outside the 6 percent limitation from \$77,972.00, the amount approved by Nyssa voters at the May 23rd election, down to \$45,862.35.

Food chairman W. L. McPartland and his committee will prepare "pit barbecue" lunches Saturday. Those wishing to have lunch must be registered by Friday night. Murlie Marcum will serve as guide and narrator, showing the group places of natural and historic interest.

Second - class mail: A handling charge of 3/10ths of a cent per piece for circulation outside home counties would become effective July 1, 1969. This would yield \$15.3 million annually and would represent a 12 percent increase in addition to the 8 percent rise scheduled to take effect January 1, 1970.

Third - class mail: For single pieces, rates would be increased one cent per piece. This would yield \$12.4 million. For regular bulk third-class, the minimum would be increased to the uniform 4.2 cents January 1, 1970, as contrasted with the present rate of 3.6 cents. The 1970 increase would lift revenues by 46.8 million annually.

Mr. Schoen, a well-known Nyssa businessman, was electrocuted Friday afternoon, June 13, 1969 in an accident at his home at 212 North First Street.

Officials and members of his family report he died while replacing a water pipe to an outside faucet. He had been working under the house, using an electric drill to bore through a floor joist, and the drill apparently shorted.

Services for William Gustave Schoen were conducted Tuesday morning at Lienkaemper chapel. Officiating was the Rev. Orville Jacobson of Faith Lutheran church. Musical selections were "What A Friend We Have In Jesus" and "When The Roll Is Called Up Yonder."

Mr. Schoen was born August 31, 1900 at Gladstone, Nebr., a son of William T. and Ida Fett Schoen, and attended Gladstone schools. He was married at Gladstone on March 23, 1923 to Agreta May Shane of Bruning, Nebr.

The family resided in Gladstone, Fairbury, and Hebron, Nebr., before moving to Nyssa in August, 1940. Mr. Schoen's lifetime occupation was a mechanic. He was employed by Ed Pruy from 1940 until 1948 and then worked at the
