The City of Nyssa will have to modify and increase the character of sewage treatment (which sewage is discharged into the Snake River). Presently the plant is a primary treating plant and the effluent or the discharge waste are only partially treated as to bacteria. To produce an acceptable waste discharge we will have to resort to a complete treating plant.
