GOP Legislators Oppose New Or Increased Taxes

SALEM — Oregon House Speaker Robert F. Smith said this week that Republican House members are opposed to any new or increased taxes.

Smith said that "no new taxes" was the message he received from Republican legislators during a statewide tour last week to sample opinion.

Smith visited with lawmakers in Bend, Klamath Falls, Medford, Albany and Portland. Thirty-six of the 38 GOP House members attended one or more of the meetings.

"There was virtually unanimous agreement that we are strongly opposed to any new taxes or any broad-based increase in taxes," Smith said.

The Speaker said "the people of Oregon spoke with a clear voice on June 3. They do not want any new taxes. They feel they are being taxed on the high heavens right now. They have drawn the line on taxes -- and I don't blame them."

Smith said that the Republicans, if called back to Salem for a special legislative session, "will adopt the position of cutting state government services wherever possible to obtain funds for aid to schools and low income homeowner property tax assistance."

Cutting programs and projects from the state budget, Smith said, "will be a most painful process, and some complete programs would most likely be eliminated. However, the people have made it clear that they expect to see more economy in government at all levels."

Smith said that "government must start practicing what it preaches about economy in government. This effort to trim back unnecessary spending must be made at all levels -- state, city, county and school districts."

Smith said the legislature "set a good example this year by chopping \$75 million from the budget proposed by the Governor. Officials at lower levels in government must follow this excellent example in preparing their own budgets."

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Hereford Tour Planned Today

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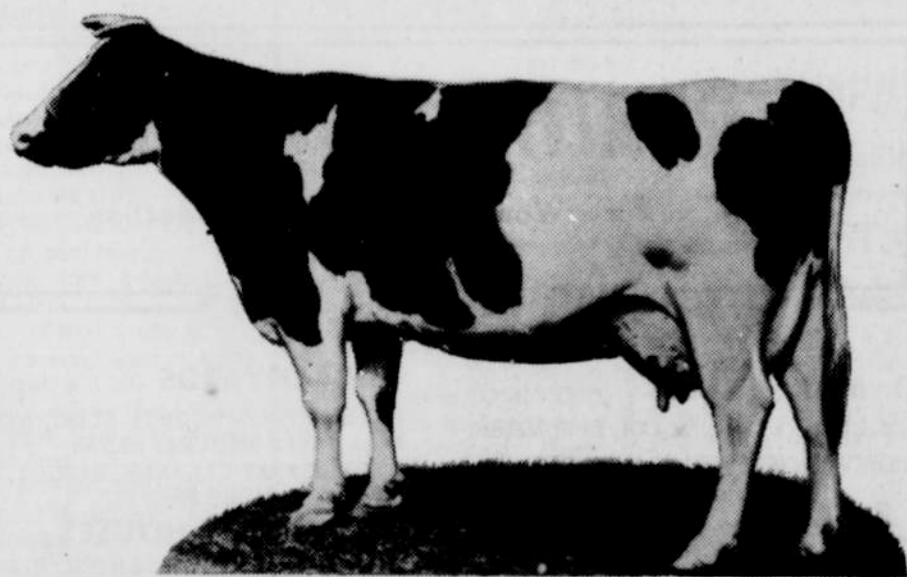
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
