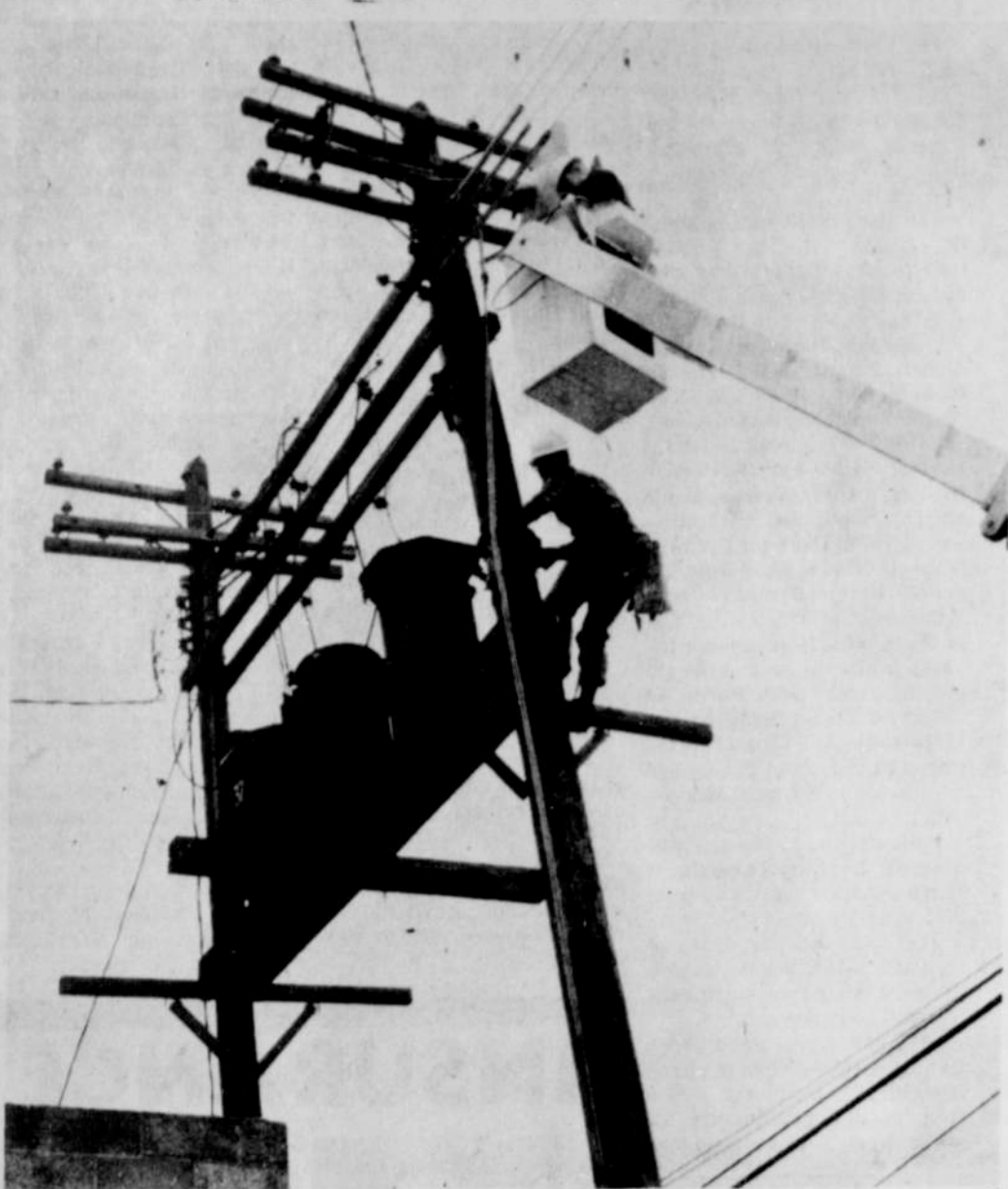


IDAHO POWER AT WORK

Beneficiaries Get \$233,00 S.S. Monthly

A record \$233,000 in monthly social security benefits was being paid to residents of Malheur County at the end of December, 1968, an increase of 2 percent above the amount payable at the end of February 1968, according to Vernon A. Welo, manager for social security.

ONE OUT OF 8 DRAWS

By the end of May 1969, social security will be paying monthly benefits to more than 25 million people -- 1 out of every 8 Americans. Although retired workers comprise the largest group of beneficiaries, almost one-fourth of all people receiving benefits are under 60. There are currently more than 3.8 million children and .5 million young widowed mothers receiving payments. Yet the public continues to think of social security as a program for old people.

AGE BREAK - DOWN

In Malheur County, 656 people under 60 are receiving benefits. That figure breaks down into 379 under 18, 83 between 18-21, and 194 between 22-59.

Many students would have been unable to continue their education were it not for the 1965 Amendments to the Social Security Act which extended survivors and dependents insurance benefits to students until their 22nd birthday. In 1968, that provision resulted in continuing benefits for 470,000 students.

Monthly payments to the family of a worker who dies leaving a widow and two or more children range from \$82.50 to \$434.40 a month, depending on the worker's average earnings under social security. Payments to the young family of a worker who dies at an early age could total as much as \$85.00 to \$100,000.

Welo also pointed out that by the end of 1968, approximately 90 percent of Americans 65 and over were either receiving cash benefits or would have been eligible for such benefits if they or their spouses had not been working.

License Agencies Provided Summary Of Fall-Hunt Data

Although the 1969 big game regulations booklet will not be available for about three weeks yet, information on the fall hunts is available at all license agencies, the Game Commission advised hunters today.

License dealers have been provided with a summary of the regulations which includes all big game season dates, bag limits, and a brief on open areas. Seasons listed in the summary include general deer and elk hunts, unit permit hunts, archery seasons, along with seasons on bighorn sheep, antelope, and black bear.

Hunters interested in filing applications for the permit drawings or for the drawings for bighorn sheep and antelope tags are requested to contact their local license dealer. Hunting licenses and big game tags may also be obtained.

The regulations booklet is expected to be distributed to license dealers about mid-July.

Truth-In-Lending Effective July 1

The civil and criminal penalties waiting violators of the federal Truth-in-Lending Act after July 1, 1969 are severe. According to Ross Runkel, a professor in commercial law at Northwestern School of Law of Lewis & Clark College, attorneys should explain to all clients who borrow or extend consumer credit what the creditor must disclose to comply with the Act. Far from being unethical, he said, it would, in fact, be improper not to check with regular clients to make sure they are aware of the legislative revision of their legal obligations.

The whole gamut of problems raised by the Truth-in-Lending Act and the Regulation Z it spawned will be discussed at the Oregon State Bar's CLE session in Portland's Memorial Coliseum on June 13, 1969, said Prof. Runkel, chairman of the session.

The materials include the Federal Reserve Board's Regulation Z and its explanation thereof, multiple credit forms, and a treatise thoroughly analyzing the law and regulations. Authorized by Professors Johnson, Jordan and Warren of UCLA and Purdue, this treatise is predicted to become the "Bible" in this field.

Local Streams Trout Stocked

The stocking of legal sized rainbow in the headwaters of the Malheur River is now underway. The North Fork in the vicinity of the Guard Station has been stocked with 2,000 legal trout averaging 11 inches in length on May 27. The lower North Fork above Beulah Reservoir will be stocked with a like number of fish on May 29. Also scheduled for stocking with legal rainbow this week are the Middle Fork of the Malheur below Logan Valley with 2,000 rainbow on June 3 and the Little Malheur River with 2,100 rainbow on June 5. All trout stocked to date have averaged around 1.3 fish per pound or 11 to 12 inches in length and are coming from the Hagerman National Fish Hatchery in Idaho.

Silver salmon or coho fingerling have been stocked in Owyhee Reservoir on an experimental basis. On May 10, one load of 62,820 three inch fingerling were released in the vicinity of Leslie Gulch. On May 13, a second load of 53,500 fingerling were released at the State Park. The salmon are not expected to reach a large size until the third year in the reservoir. It is hoped that their urge to migrate to the ocean will occur at a time when they cannot escape from the reservoir. Once the smolting stage is past, salmon become satisfied residents of the reservoir and mature in three years.

Game Commission personnel are busy this week making bioassays on Bully Creek Reservoir using a new fish toxicant which may make it possible to chemically treat the reservoir

Little League Cowboys Continue Winning Ways

With a 5-0 season record, the Little League Minor Cow Hollow Cowboys continued their winning ways this week by defeating the Payette No. 1 lads, making it six wins, no losses. The final score of the Cowboy - Payette contest was 1-0.

Paul Gooch, on the mound for the Cowboys, pitched a no hitter, while the opposing hurler, Jay Youngblood, allowed five hits. The Cow Hollow catcher was Kent Cleaver, with R. Hanley behind the plate for the Idaho lads.

The Cowboy's only score was made in the first inning when San Hartley walked to first,

at a much lower cost than would be possible with rotenone. The bio-assays are used to determine what concentrations of chemical are required to kill the various species of fish. The new chemical Fintrol is used in concentrations of so many parts per billion of water where as the old stand by rotenone is used in concentrations of so many parts per million. The new chemical also has the decided advantage in that it does not repel fish like rotenone. It does not kill the aquatic food organisms and it can be used selectively and not kill catfish or bass.
