Economic Outlook

agricultural economist at Oregon State University, writes that the economy has seemed to shrug off attempts of the government to slow inflation, but indications are that the real growth pace is slower. After adjustment for price inflation, the real growth was under three percent for the first quarter of 1969. This is down from five percent last year. Other statistics, however, reveal that the overall pace of growth accelerated in recent months after hesitating in late 1968.

Personal income, Coppedge pointed out, indicated a seasonally adjusted annual rate of \$730.5 billion in April, up \$2.8 billion from March. This monthly increase, however, reflected a slowdown. The increase from February to March was \$6.5 billion. Economists, Coppedge included, caution against reading a trend into one month's figures. Until April's initial indications of an economic slowdown are reinforced by statistics in following months, most predictions will likely be hedged with qualifying phrases, Coppedge said.

The fiscal measures taken by the government to brake

inflation have not produced immediate results, but indications are that adequate restrictions on inflation are in force and it will take more time for the effect to be felt. A slower growth rate is expected in the last half of 1969.

Coppedge pointed out a significant aspect of economic activity. Forecasts of economic activity are usually based on changes in the federal budget, taxes, the money supply, and the interest rate.

But an important segment of the economy has been ignored, Coppedge said. The consumer, who accounts for a full 63 percent of gross national product, has delighted in knocking forecasts askew and complicating economic policy in the past few years. By varying his spending - saving ratio, the consumer may reinforce a slowdown, or intensify inflationary pressures in the economy.
