It is easily accessible from Oregon highway 86, which ends at Oxbow, and from a road extending downstream 13 miles from Brownlee Dam. Both routes, built in connection with the utility's hydro development, are surfaced.

Smith, who supervises operation of Idaho Power's complex of migrant fish-conservation facilities, pointed out that fishing for trout and bass usually is "excellent" in the waters adjacent to the park.

Within walking distance of the park is the company's Oxbow hatchery, one of four being used in a program to transfer Hells Canyon - run spring Chinook salmon and steelhead to the Salmon River watershed.

The new park takes its name from a copper mining community that flourished at Oxbow in the early 1900's and gained the dubious distinction of being -- as one historian noted -- "as wild as the river flowing through this awesome canyon."

Peterson said corn processing was due to start the latter part of this week with a full schedule due next week. This will be delayed and early processing possibly eliminated until new compressors secured and installed. However, two tunnels in the onion building were not damaged and some corn can be processed through them, Peterson said.

In July of last year fire destroyed an onion fresh-pack building was destroyed on the Ontario plant site. It was replaced and not damaged in this fire.

BOONDOGGING — Years ago Robert P. Griffin (R-Mich.) as a member of the House suggested that Congress should decree that the number of employees in the Department of Agriculture must never exceed the number of farmers in America. Now a Senator, Griffin noted "when I proposed that amendment there were 8,869,000 farmers in America and 89,398 employees in the Department of Agriculture. Today the number of farmers has gone down to 4,638,000 at 41 percent decrease. The number of Agriculture Department employees has increased to 212,113, an increase of 137 percent. In other words, there were formerly 87 farmers for every Agriculture Department employee. Today, there are only 22 farmers for every employee."

You can imagine what a stir was caused 12 years later when the famous "Brownie" made its appearance for only \$1. And the 6-exposure film which took 2 1/4 x 2 1/4 - inch snapshots was only 15 cents. Besides that, for an additional 75 cents you could go get a kit to develop and print your own pictures.

Those days and prices are gone forever, but the development of cameras has been outstanding. Today you have color, sound, movement, instant developing. Grandpa would have been astounded.

Another leisure pastime that is making news lately is in the children's game department. Only the games have become adult entertainment.

Along with tic tac toe, chess, checkers, and jig-saw puzzles, whole families are taking up such things as Instant Insanity, Deelie Bobbers, and Soma. Insanity is just four cubes of different colors that you try to arrange so all four colors show. Sounds easy but the name is apt! Deelie Bobbers are soothing by comparison. They let you do your own thing by putting little notched plastic rounds together any way. It's a sort of doodling in three dimensions. As for Soma, it's a seven-piece cub puzzle that can form dozens of structures. To play alone or competitively, it has become a cocktail table accessory that's a real ice-breaker for a party.
