WORK SMARTER - NOT HARDER

SHOE POLISH ON PLASTIC upholstery will stain permanently unless removed immediately.

Wipe the stain area with kerosene, naphtha, or lighter fluid. But first, make a quick pre-test on an inconspicuous area because not all plastics are alike. These fluids may affect the color or texture.

PUCKERED SEAMS IN WASH and wear fabrics of manmade fiber are a problem to many home sewers.

Elaine Carlson, Oregon State University Extension clothing specialist, suggests some ideas to help. Use fine needles and a fine sewing thread with the same degree of stability and flexibility as the fabric.

Sew with less tension than usual on the top and bottom thread. Place a strip of masking tape over the needle hole of the machine to prevent fabrics, especially sheers, from being pulled down and becoming puckered. Sew at a moderate rate of speed.

FOR BACKYARD COOKING, use care with electricity. Although small appliances operate adequately outdoors, don't rely on indoor wiring to supply the electricity. Extension cords made for indoor use do not have proper insulation to be used where there's dampness from dew and wet ground.

All cords, plugs, sockets and bulbs used outside should be weatherproof. When using electrical appliances, stay on dry ground. Never use electric power when standing on a damp patio or when it is raining. Outdoor electric cords for barbecue rotisserie grills or fire starters should not cross hot metal surfaces. The insulation may melt and cause a short circuit.

MATCHING DESIGNS AT the seams when you sew a dress is important for a truly professional look. We asked Elaine Carlson, Oregon State University Extension clothing specialist, how much extra fabric to buy to allow for matching.

It seems there isn't an exact rule, but a good guide is to buy one extra design length for each two places which are to be matched.

If a design is four inches long and the design will be matched in four places, this means you will need to buy eight inches extra fabric.

IS FROST ACCUMULATING around the inside edge of your freezer near the door seal? The seal may not be properly seated and is allowing warm, moisture-laden air to get inside. As the warm air is cooled, the moisture "rains" out and freezes.

To remedy the situation, you may need a new door gasket. Or perhaps using several layers of masking tape to properly seat the seal will turn the trick.

Also, if you're in the habit of putting warm foods in the refrigerator, this may be your problem. Avoid storing uncovered liquids or foods containing a lot of moisture.

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Serviceman Earns Awards

Sgt. Gerald R. (Butch) Bingman, a former Nyssa and son of Mr. and Mrs. Dale Bingman of Cambridge, Idaho, recently received the U.S. Army's Bronze Star Medal with 'V' Device for heroic action in Vietnam. The serviceman is a grandson of Nyssans Mr. and Mrs. George C. (Pete) Shaw.

Date of action was March 23, 1969, and the awards were presented by direction of the President of the United States. The citation reads as follows: "For heroism in ground-combat against a hostile force in the Republic of Vietnam, Sgt. Bingman distinguished himself by exceptionally valorous actions while serving as a squad leader in Company C, Second Battalion, 501st Infantry, on a combat operation in the A Shau Valley."

Company C was moving up a ridge line when it came under intense enemy fire. Bingman moved to the foremost position of his squad and placed his men in position. Then, with complete disregard for his own safety and ignoring the intense enemy fire he was attracting, he began to advance toward the enemy position, throwing hand grenades and firing his M-16 rifle.

He terminated his charge only after helicopter gunships arrived and commenced firing against the enemy position. During the first lull of the gunships, the Sergeant again advanced through hostile fire to throw more grenades into the enemy position, completely silencing it.

Sergeant Bingman's personal bravery and devotion to duty were in keeping with the highest traditions of the military service and reflect great credit upon himself, his unit, and the United States Army."

Sgt. Bingman also received another Bronze Star for meritorious service, a army commendation medal for meritorious service, air medal for making a combat assault by helicopter into a bombing zone under fire, two Vietnamese service medals, and a combat infantry badge.

"Butch" is now a paratrooper, serving with the 101st airborne division's Screaming Eagles, and is up for promotion to Staff Sergeant. He plans to return to the United States around Sept. 4 and will visit his family in this area.
