**OSU Expects 15,000 Students**

An estimated 15,000 students are expected in Corvallis later this month when opening of classes at Oregon State University marks the beginning of the university's second century.

The anticipated enrollment compares with 14,500 a year ago and reflects in-state and out-of-state tuition increases approved by the state legislature, according to Wallace E. Gibbs, university registrar.

One of the biggest changes at OSU this fall, said Gibbs, will be computer-assisted registration--the first such system for any college or university within the Oregon State System of Higher Education.

University officials explain that the computer-assisted program will efficiently aid students in organizing their class schedules and is expected to reduce much of the paper work for students, speed registration procedures and provide the fastest registration system possible.

Ten new degree programs will be started this fall at OSU including bachelor degree offerings in technical journalism, metallurgical engineering, Russian, religious studies and American studies.

New master's degree programs will be offered in atmospheric sciences, ocean engineering and metallurgical engineering as well as doctorate programs in atmospheric sciences and metallurgical engineering.
