Bulldogs Down Payette 14-0

The penalty plagued Nyssa high school Bulldogs recorded 14-0 whitewash of Payette here last Friday night. Several times during the contest Nyssa mounted sustained drives which threatened to turn the low-scoring ball game into a rout, only to be halted by penalties deep within Pirate territory. Ron Moffis paced the Nyssa offense with 130-yards in 22 carries. Payette failed to generate any serious offensive thrusts. Any hopes of the Pirates were quelled late in the fourth quarter when Dave Danford intercepted a Pirate pass to insure the Bulldog victory.

The Bulldogs established superiority early in the opening stanza as half-backs Keith Oldemeyer and Ron Moffis bust through the porous Payette defense for substantial gains. After one drive was stopped by a penalty, the Bulldogs held Payette on downs and resumed their impressive ground game after the Pirate punt. A driving sixty-yards closed when Oldemeyer carried on a drive at right tackle for the first Nyssa touchdown. Moffis carried for the two points after and Nyssa led 8-0. The Bulldogs had rolled up one hundred yards at the end of the first quarter.

In the second quarter, the Pirates stopped the Bulldogs inside the Pirate 15 and got out of trouble with a 30-yard end run. But the Nyssans held at midfield and the Pirates punted. After an exchange of punts the Bulldogs got rolling again. Scott Engstrom powered up the middle for seven-yards and Rick Chester weaved his way at right tackle for seven more to put the ball in scoring position. But the Pirates broke through to drop Steve Ross for a loss and another opportunity had been stymied. The half ended with the score - Nyssa, 8; Payette, 0.

In the third period, the Bulldogs got their halfback duo underway again but didn't seriously threaten until Moffis hit Dave Wilson for thirty-yards to put the ball on the Pirate six-yard line. Two plays later, Oldemeyer took it in to run the count to 14-0. The try for two points failed.
The Bulldogs dominated the final period also, but couldn't get anything on the board. A fumble killed one drive and a Dave Manley pass slipped away from his receiver to end the final Nyssa threat. A few plays later Danford picked off a Pirate pass to wrap it up for the home town boys.

Coach Harry McGinley's crew travels to Vallive Friday evening to take on a strong Falcon eleven. The Bulldogs will be looking for more consistency on offense and a duplication of their fine defensive effort. They will need both to win.

Biologists expect a good chukar season this fall but only fair at best for Hungarians. Although winter mortality took some adult birds, production this spring and summer is reported excellent.
Best gunning is expected in the Deschutes and John Day canyons; the breaks of the Powder, Burnt, and Innaha; the Snake River canyons; and drainages of the Malheur and Owyhee. The east slopes of the Steens are expected good, but elsewhere through Harney and Lake counties hunting will be spotty.

Parma started the scoring by quarter-back, Rick Johnson, running one-yard for a second quarter touchdown. Seconds later Adrian drove to Parma's one-yard line but the time ran out before points were made.

Kavemen Club Grizzlies 14-0

The Kavemen, led by Gene Strobel and Robin Nelson swept over the Grizzlies like a hurricane in the 14-0 Southwestern Idaho league win Friday night.

Two passes from quarterback Mark Johnson went flying over 31 and 55 yards in addition to scoring on a two-yard run. Nelson scored on runs of 5, 49 and 46 yards to make a total of 40 points for the year.

This win makes the third in a row for the Kuna squad, without a single loss. This game was also the first in league play for the Kavemen.
Fruitland now stands 2-2 for the season so far, and 0-1 in league play.

In the third period of play the two clubs fought back and forth between their 30-yard lines. Early in the fourth quarter Adrian scored their first touchdown when Condra ran six-yards. The try for point after TD failed and the score stood 6-6.
Then behind some fine offensive blocking, the Antelopes drove 78-yards for their final, and winning touchdown, with Condra scoring the points on a four-yard run. Condra then threw the pigskin to Rod Price for the two-point conversion.
Condra finished the night by gaining 152 yards rushing and another 53 yards in passing.
Adrian's defense did another fine job, allowing Parma only 78-yards the first half and 70-yards the second. The Antelope defense was led by Duncan, Martin, Price and Grace.
The Antelope's next game will be with Nampa Christian in Adrian, Thursday night, Oct. 2, at 8:00 p.m. This will be Adrian's first league game.

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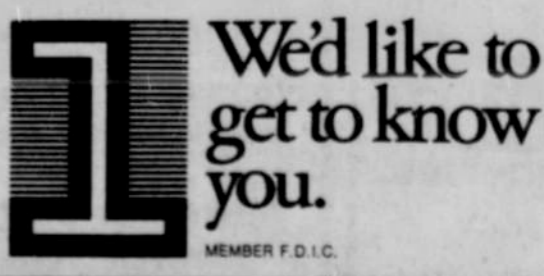
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
