Felton and recorded at page 35283, Volume 27, State Record of Water Right Certificates, confirms a right to the use of 0.33 cubic foot per second of water from Snake River for the irrigation of, among other lands, 4.99 acres in SE 1/4 NW 1/4, Sec. 28, 3.15 acres in SE 1/4 NE 1/4 and 5.0 acres in NE 1/4 SE 1/4, Sec. 29, T. 19 S., R. 47 E., W. M., with a date of priority of May 25, 1925.

These lands are irrigated from a point of diversion located N 28 degrees E 23.2 chains from the SW corner of Sec. 28, T. 19 S., R. 47 E., being within Lot 4 (NW 1/4 SW 1/4) of Sec. 28, T. 19 S., R. 47 E., W. M.

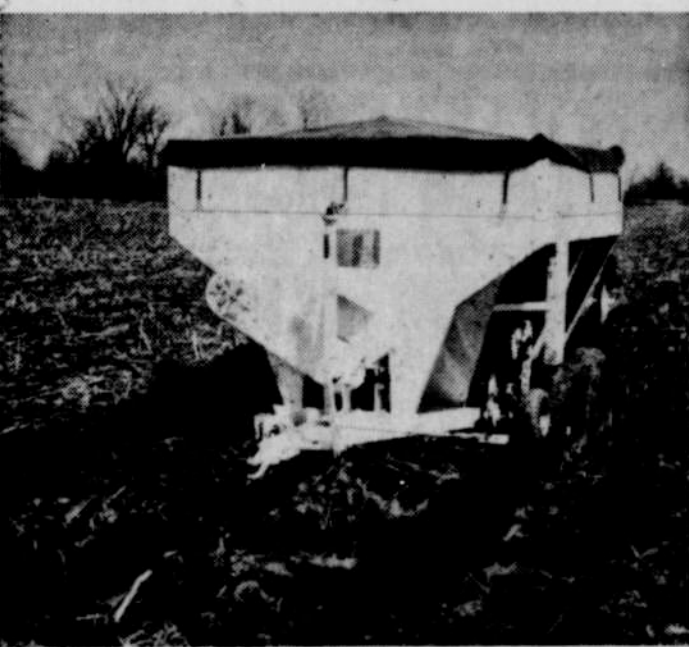

Agri-Business Head Discusses Current Field-Burning Methods

Don't hum, whistle or sing "Smoke Gets In Your Eyes" in many sections of the Willamette Valley. The local gentry, particularly in the Eugene-Springfield area, won't think it's a bit funny.

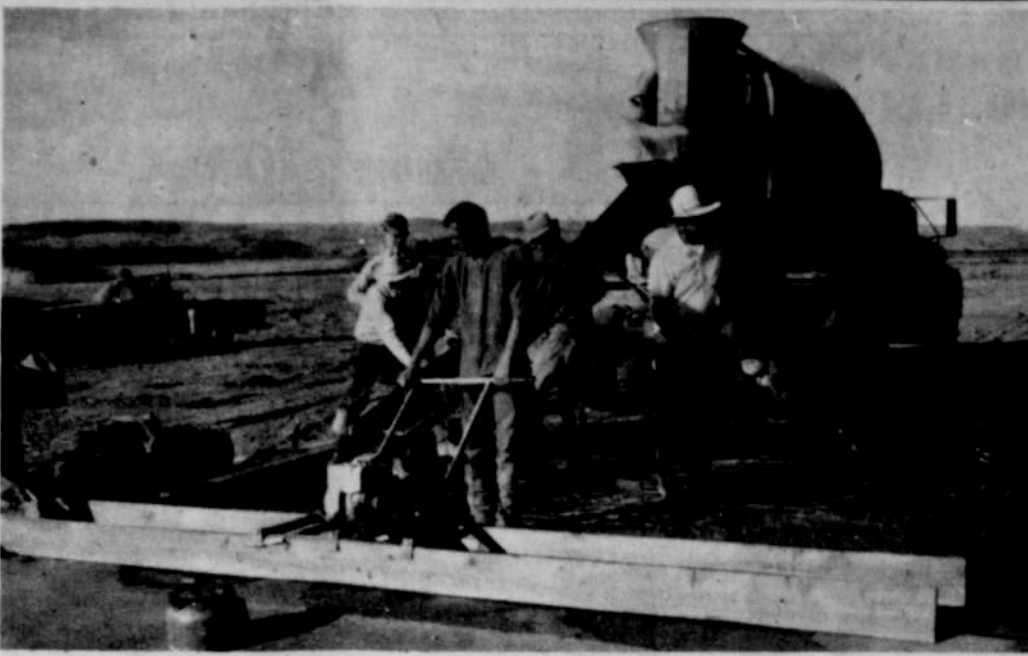
Something else that's not funny, says the Agri-Business Council, is that panic over current field burning methods is threatening a vital segment of our economy.

Oregon's grass seed growers are involved in the classic confrontation pitting urban comfort against rural economy. "Both sides will have to give a little," says council president, Gordon Walker, "or we're liable to drive agriculture right out of the state."

Walker is quick to point out that agribusiness is estimated as a \$2 1/2 billion industry in Oregon, second only to timber.

"An intensified search for alternate solutions to the field burning practices must involve all segments of our population," Walker emphasizes. "The constructive solutions and conversion possibilities are of importance to everyone in the state—not just the seed growers."

The smoke problem is the result of burning straw, which is the waste product after harvesting grass seed. The fields are burned, not only to get rid of the straw, but also to eliminate the many diseases and insects that plague the grass fields.

TRAILER-TYPE VEHICLES LICENSING TO BE CHANGED

The growing number of camper, travel trailer, mobile home and motor home owners in Oregon will face new licensing requirements under a law approved by the 1969 Oregon Legislature.

Although the effective date is still several months away, the Motor Vehicles Division already has started planning for the revised program, according to Chester W. Ott, administrator. The new separates vehicles formerly known as house trailers in to two classes -- recreational vehicles and mobile homes.

EFFECTIVE MARCH '70

The law will require campers to be licensed for the first time on or before March 31, 1970. It changes the method of calculating fees for other types of units, beginning January 1, 1970.

Ott says the agency plans to issue license plates for more than 20,000 estimated camper units in the area. The plates will be black with white numbers. Camper fees will be \$10 plus \$1.50 per foot for each foot of length over the first 10 feet. There also will be a \$2 title fee when the unit is first registered or ownership is transferred.

Travel trailers, including tent trailer, up to 32 feet will receive red plates with white numbers. Fees will be calculated according to length of the unit with a basic fee of \$10 plus \$1.50 per foot for each foot over the first 10 feet. The agency believes about 43,000 of the more than 80,000 units licensed as house trailers will come under the definition of a travel trailer when the new law takes effect.

Motor homes, which are defined as motor vehicles originally designed, reconstructed or permanently altered to provide facilities for human habitation, or with a permanent camper attached, will pay a license fee of \$20 plus \$1.50 per foot for each foot over the first 10 feet under the new law. Length will include the vehicle and chassis. Plates will be gold with blue numbers.

Moneys collected for campers, motor homes and travel trailers will go toward parks acquisition and development.

Under the new law, most mobile home owners -- an estimated 37,000 of them -- can expect to pay higher license fees over a longer period of time than at present, Ott said.

MOBILE HOME DEFINED

The law defines a mobile home as a unit designed to be transported or used upon the highways, capable of human habitation or for business, commercial or office purposes. It must be over 32 feet in length, and there are several other height and weight considerations specified in the law. Plates will be blue with gold numbers.

The registration will be \$6, plus a license fee of two percent of the taxable market value of the mobile home. This value is related to the suggested retail price as delivered from the manufacturer. The market value the first year is 90 percent of the suggested retail price, and there is a yearly depreciation of five percent provided up to nine years. For the ninth and succeeding years,

the market value is set at 50 percent of the suggested retail price.

The law since 1960 has provided for a license fee of 2 percent applied to 80 percent of the market value when the trailer was new.

Under the new law, a mobile home may be declared a dwelling by a county assessor if it has been placed on private property and has substantially lost its identity as a vehicle. It then goes on the county property tax rolls. A mobile home owner may also request that his unit be declared a dwelling and taxed on that basis rather than as a vehicle.

CHECK GUARANTEES which come with your new appliances to see what the manufacturer requires. Some purchases need to be registered with the company in order to make the guarantee good.

Many appliances operate trouble-free for years, but an occasional trouble-maker will pop up. Keep all your guarantees where you can find them and also note your responsibilities as an owner.

Some people say they can't understand the legal jargon in the guarantee. To help avoid misunderstandings, ask your County Extension office for a free copy of our leaflet, "Guarantees and Adjustments."
