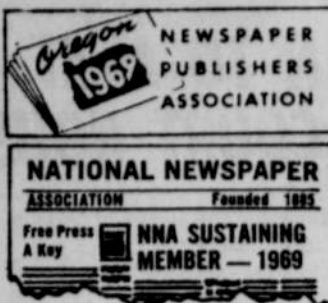

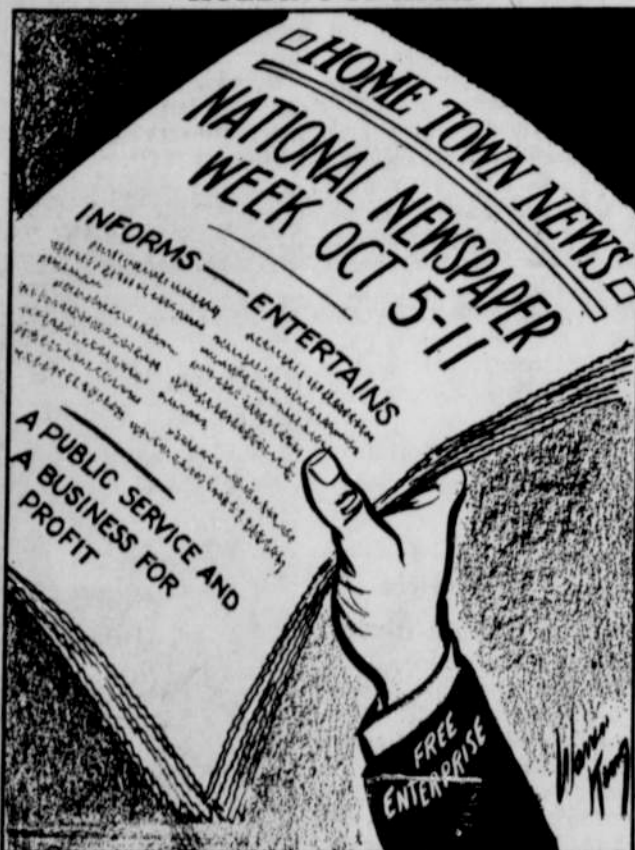

National Employ The Physically Handicapped Week October 5 - 11

Governor Tom McCall has designated this week, Oct. 5-11 as National Employ The Physically Handicapped Week in Oregon. During the week the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped opens its year around program of education and information. The purpose of the Week is to stimulate interest and create awareness of the approximately 200,000 physically, socially and mentally handicapped men and women in Oregon. Governor McCall said on signing the statement, "With understanding and concern each of us can support the good work of the Committee on Employment of the Handicapped to open up new vistas and new opportunities for our handicapped citizens. Some of the handicapped are our neighbors; some are returning Viet Nam veterans; some are members of a family we may know, or know about. It has been demonstrated that they can be restored through vocational rehabilitation and employability training to productive and satisfying lives. They can be helped to become self-supporting. They depend heavily, however, on the opportunity for work."

"Many employers in Oregon have responded sincerely to the slogan, 'hire the handicapped.' We find in plants and factories, offices and stores, testimony of the enlightened employment practices of our most respected employers. The deaf, blind, the amputee, the stroke victim, the cardiac, the mental retardate -- in fact, the entire gamut of disabilities -- all are contributing through work to the good of the community."

"Additional responses are necessary from more employers for still others of our handicapped neighbors who are searching for that job opportunity. They are not asking for charity or sympathy; they merely seek the chance to prove their ability. And they are contributing members of the community, supporting themselves and their families, the entire community is enriched," the Governor said.

LDS Church Provides Youth Instruction

Religious training along with secular education is a way of life for the majority of LDS youth.

The local leaders of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, under the direction of Nyssa Stake President Dehlin A. Erickson, are providing for the high school and college age students in the area a program of daily religious instruction.

This year 230 high school students are enrolled in Seminary and are divided into 10 groups. The classes are being held in the ward meetinghouses in Nyssa, Parma, Ontario and Vale. Starting time each school day is 7:30 a.m.

This means setting the alarm one hour or one and one-half hours earlier than normally. For those who have farm chores to do it may mean getting out of bed at 4:30.

For all the family it means cooperation and discipline. Families work together to arrange transportation and, when necessary, parents take turns driving the car loaded with the neighbor's children, along with their own.

Three years of attendance is required to graduate from Seminary, but most students voluntarily continue their studies throughout their four years of high school. Each year one of the four standard courses is offered from the Old Testament, New Testament, Book of Mormon or Church History. Opportunities are given to all at different times to serve as a class officer, or to take part in the speech and music activities.

For the college age student the program of an LDS Institute of Religion is available on most college campuses, for the purpose of offering professional religious education, along with social and devotional programs and counseling help to those seeking aid.

At TVCC Dr. Paul R. Searle is Director of the Institute where 80 students are expected to be enrolled when registration is completed for 1969-1970.

Motivation for carrying out these programs comes from the belief that spiritual knowledge is necessary to a balanced life,

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IS FALL FERTILIZING IN THE CARDS FOR YOU?

Would you be better off to spread fertilizer this fall or wait until next spring? It all depends on your particular situation. There is no pat answer that fits every farmer, every grower. Here are factors for and against fall fertilizing that you can apply to your own crop land:

NO

- ☐ My land would erode if I spread fertilizer and plowed or disced it in this fall.
- ☐ I have coarse, sandy soil that leaches badly.
- ☐ I have poorly drained land and water often stands on it.
- ☐ My finances would favor waiting until next spring.

YES

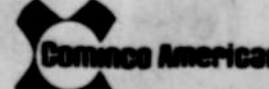
- ☐ I'll have no problem getting the spreading equipment over the fields this fall.
- ☐ I'll have less spring work pile-up if fertilizer is spread this fall ahead of fall plowing or disking.
- ☐ By getting my crops planted earlier next spring, yields should go up.
- ☐ I'll have less soil compaction to hold yields back; the ground is usually drier in the fall. And spring thaws usually loosen it up again.
- ☐ I get better spreading service in the fall.
- ☐ There are better supplies of fertilizer in the fall.
- ☐ Phosphorus, potassium, sulphur, zinc and boron almost always produce better crops when applied in the fall and worked in.
- ☐ Soil test results come back faster in the fall.
- ☐ I could apply the expense of fall applied fertilizer against my tax return this year.
