It's Your Law!

ORAL AGREEMENTS

Oral agreements are hard to
enforce because they are hard
to prove. In a recent case
Tom Tycoon owned stock in his
own company which he wanted
to sell to the public. He went
to Sam Stockman and asked
him to find a broker to sell
the stock to the public. Sam
was supposed to get a "finder's
fee" but it was not clear wheth-
er or not the stock had to be
sold to the public before he
earned his fee. Complications
in getting the stock listed pre-
vented any stock from being sold
to the public.

Sam sued Tom to collect his
"finder's fee," claiming that all
he was supposed to do was find

a stock broker. This he had
done. Tom defended on the
ground that it was "agreed"
that no fee was due unless
the stock was actually sold to
the public. The court resolved
the dispute in Sam's favor. It
awarded him \$2,000 as a rea-
sonable fee. On appeal the
higher court affirmed the award
declaring "the oral evidence
will be liberally construed to
uphold the judgment of the
court."

The higher court can always
review a written contract whose
words can be interpreted by
another judge.

But in deciding whether there
is an oral agreement and what
it means, the judge usually
has two or more versions. The
trial court must decide which
party to believe. Since the
trial judge could see and ac-
tually hear the witnesses, his
judgment is superior to that
of some reviewing judges who
merely read the typewritten
record.

servicemen, principally in
Vietnam, since early summer.
"I urge interested citizens,
veterans organizations and ser-
vice clubs to make donations to
the flag fund," Myers said.
"Judging from the letters we
receive, these flags apparently
mean a great deal to our boys
overseas, and I wouldn't like
to see the fund discontinued."

Myers noted that a legisla-
tive appropriation for the flag
fund, that was intended to cover
the biennium, has been one-
third expended since July 1.
It costs \$5.59 to mail a flag
overseas.

The Oregon State Flag Fund
was established in 1966 through
a private donation to provide
free state flags for Oregon boys
serving in the armed forces
overseas. The 1967 and 1969
legislature appropriated funds
to supplement donated money.

Myers said checks should be
made payable to Oregon State
Flag Fund, and mailed to Room
121, State Capitol, Salem,
Oregon.

Walter Devereux, the distinguished president of the National
Horse Show Association and also of its most prestigious annual

performances.

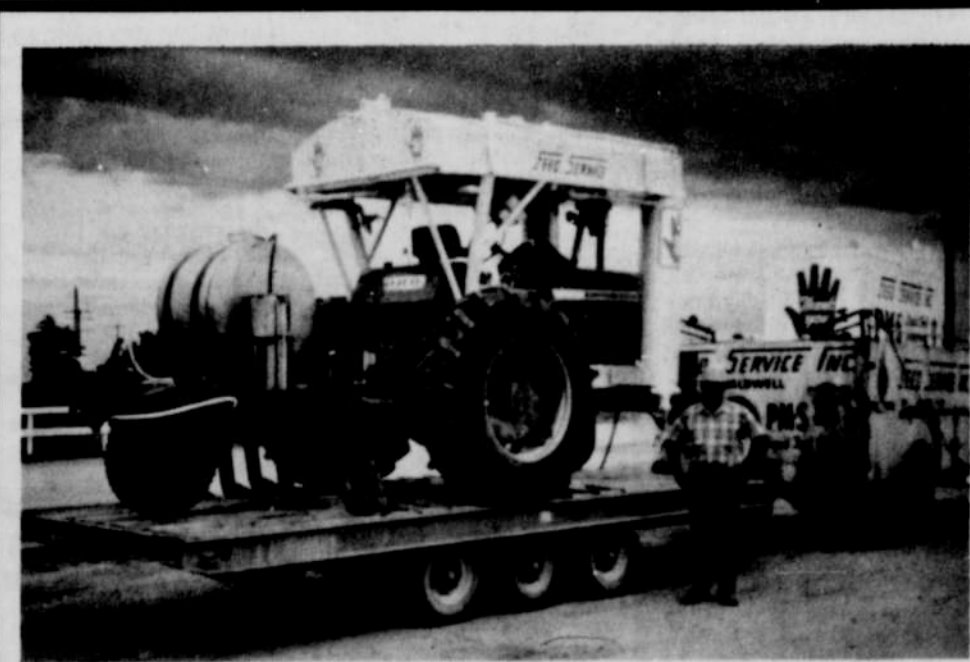
An extra added attraction
