

NORTHROP WRITES MUSIC ARTICLE

Craig D. Northrup, director of instrumental music for Nyssa Public Schools, is the author of an article titled "The Shape of Oregon's Beginning Instrumental Music" which appears in the current issue of the Oregon Music Educator.

This article is a report on the research that Mr. Northrup had compiled with a survey of 114 school districts in Oregon in an attempt to determine what grade level was best to start beginning band. The scholarly journal goes to all music instructors in the state of Oregon and many out-of-state subscribers.

Northrup, employed in Nyssa since 1967, is currently president of Snake River Valley Music Teacher's Association and last year was president of District IX, Oregon Educator's Association, and on the Board of Directors for that organization.

The local music instructor is a graduate from the Conservatory of Music of the University of the Pacific at Stockton and also received his master of music degree from the same institution.

Student musicians from throughout this area are members this year of the 145 piece Oregon State University Marching Band. The band's fall term schedule is highlighted by performances at football games.

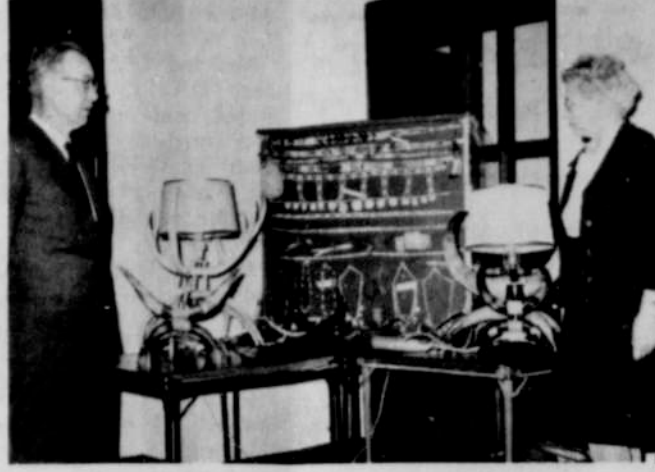

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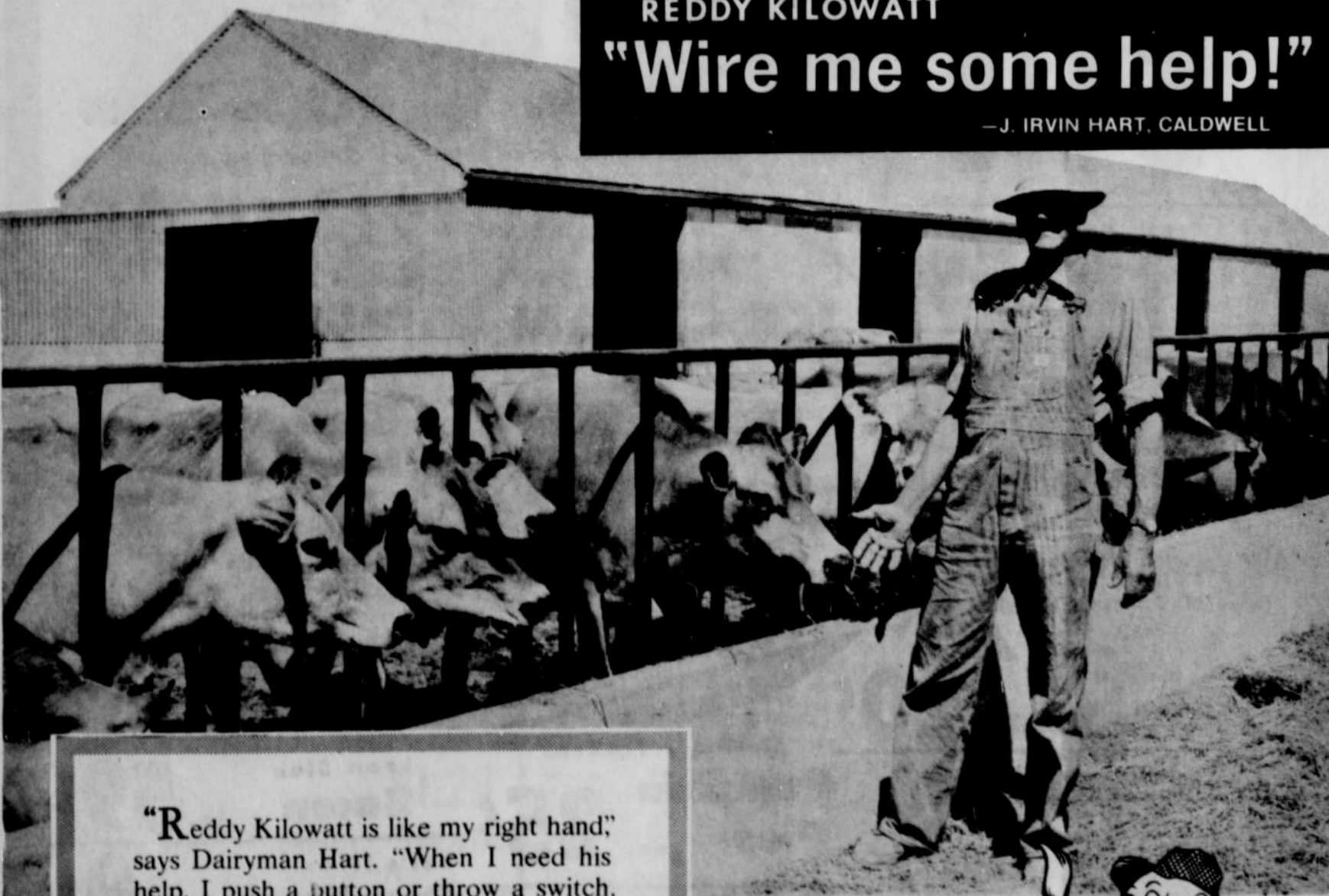
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
