Don Bates, Nyssa High School instructor, said that similar rewarding experiences will be happening throughout the Nyssa Schools as dramatics are used in various ways to enhance learning.

What is "Creative Dramatics"? Of what value are puppetry, role-playing, play-acting, and pantomimes? These activities provide opportunities for a student to adopt another's personality, feelings, responses, and character. Through improvisations, he learns how others feel and why they feel the way they do.

Through creative dramatics, a student learns to better know himself by doing something from "deep down inside"; to express ideas and to be a better communicator. Recent Nyssa High School graduates who have found participation in dramatics gratifying enough to pursue further study are drama majors Karen Hust at BYU, and Greg Sumner at Idaho State University. Warren Adams is minoring in Drama at the College of Idaho and Peggy Moore is active in Dramatics at Rick's College.

Several students at Nyssa High School are presently in rehearsal for an "Evening of One-Act Plays" which will be presented November 7 and 8. One play is a fantasy fashioned after the writings of Lewis Carroll and the other, a comedy, is a hilarious play written by Betty Knapp. Ken Spitze, Mary Wahlert, Barbara Bieby, Brad Talbot, Nancy Seward, Alicia Huffman, Doug Garner, Joyce Jennings, Mark Grieg, Monty Howard, Pam Skeen, Marlo Fife, Patty Ross, Nancy Bale, Larry Meyers, and Pam Snyder are in the casts. Bates said that parents are urged to encourage their children to take an active part in the various phases of dramatics whether it be acting, working backstage, or merely as an observer. It could be one of the most rewarding experiences that their children will ever have.

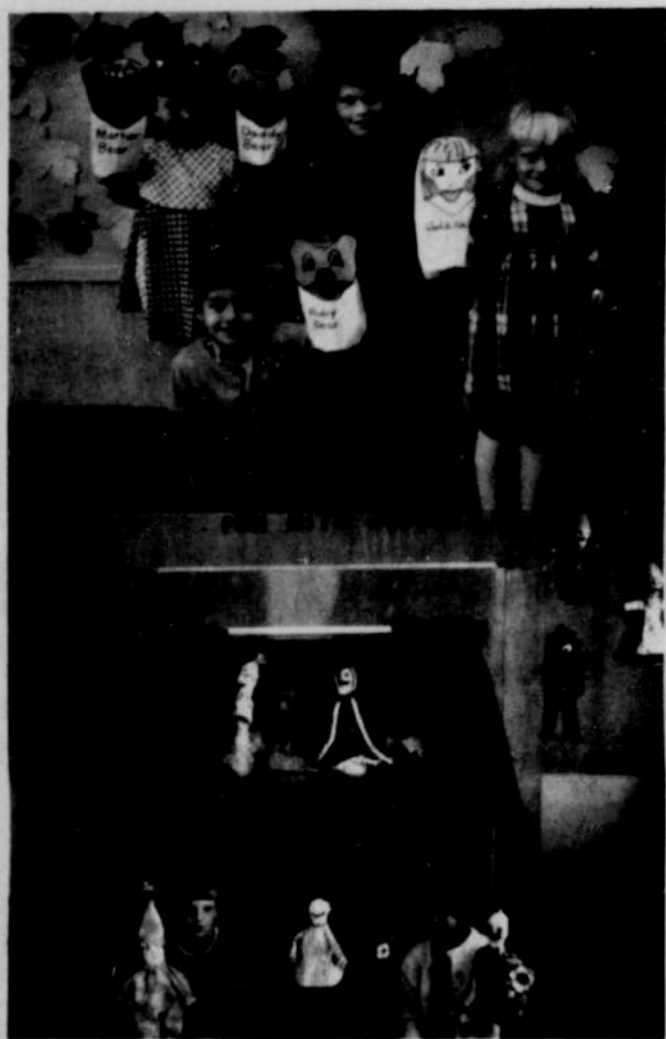
