Winter Trout Season Begins

Oregon sport fishermen are reminded that Friday, Oct. 31 marks the end of the general summer trout season. Beginning Saturday, Nov. 1, and extending through the winter months, the more restrictive winter angling rules will be in effect.

Anglers will find the winter regulations in the rule book beginning on page 39. Fishermen will note that the winter regulations list only those waters which are open to angling. All waters not listed are closed. Most streams also have specific upstream deadlines above which anglers cannot fish.

Bag limits are also reduced. During the winter season anglers are allowed only 2 trout, steelhead, and salmon 12 inches or over in length per day. An exception is Zone 1, where the bag limit for salmon is 3 per day. The aggregate bag limit in Zone 1 is 3 such fish. Anglers are urged to check the winter rules carefully for bag limits, deadlines, and other regulations.

Some waters of the state remain open to year-round trout fishing and the regular summer bag limit applies. Winter trout angling, according to Game Commission fishery biologists, has become increasingly popular in recent years, especially when lakes or impoundments are frozen over to allow fishing through the ice. Waters open to year-round trout fishing are found listed by zone in the general summer trout fishing section of the synopsis.

Freeway Completed Portland To Pendleton

The final bottleneck to four-lane freeway traffic between Portland and Pendleton was eliminated on Tuesday, October 28, when the Highway Division opened its new stretch of Interstate 80N through Tooth Rock Tunnel, it was announced today by Forrest Cooper, state highway engineer.

Construction on this 1.43-mile stretch of highway, officially called the Bonneville-Hood River County Line Section of Interstate 80N, has been one of the most difficult in state highway annals because of its location and need to keep river, rail and road traffic moving at all times. It is adjacent to the pool formed by the Bonneville Dam, the main line of the Union Pacific Railroad, and the main east-west highway. Traffic on any of these three facilities could not be halted at any time.

The contract was awarded on March 17, 1967, with the project expected to cost approximately \$5,700,000. It involved building a viaduct along the edge of Tooth Rock Mountain and the Columbia River for westbound traffic and the modernization of the present highway tunnel for eastbound traffic. This modernization included lowering of the deck of the tunnel by approximately four feet to give additional headroom, widening of the travel lanes, painting of the walls, and new and improved lighting.

Highway Division warned that while the tunnel was open October 28, work still remains to be accomplished, so motorists are urged to use extreme caution in driving through the construction area. Crossovers and auxiliary lanes used during the construction period must be removed under traffic conditions. This means heavy construction equipment and workers will be active in this area. This cleanup work is expected to take approximately three to four weeks.

With the opening of the east-bound lanes in this stretch of I-80N, it means that the motorist can drive from Portland to Pendleton under freeway conditions with no traffic lights to worry about. The Highway Division expects to open the Pendleton Bypass around the middle of November, which will provide 211.5 miles of uninterrupted freeway driving between Portland and east of Pendleton.

Persons wishing original license or permits to drive are asked to file applications well ahead of the scheduled closing hour in order to assure time for completion of the required license test.
