BLM Transfers

Eighty acres of public land located along the Deschutes River near Madras, Oregon, have been conveyed by the Bureau of Land Management to the Oregon State Game Commission for development as a fish hatchery. The hatchery will be located below the mouth of Squaw Creek from which it derives its name.

Cost of the area to the State was \$200. The special pricing of \$2.50 an acre is authorized by the Recreation and Public Purposes Act.

In addition to the hatchery, future development plans call for construction of a road and housing facilities.

Lois Spitze Teaches Eulogy Used During Services For Mrs. Maurice Corey

Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Spitze, recently received a telephone call from their daughter, Lois, via satellite from the island of Kwajalein in the Marshall Islands.

Lois is beginning her second year of teaching in the high school mathematics department. The parents of Lois' students work on the Missile base.

Lois has enjoyed her work and spends her extra hours scuba diving, sailing and fishing. She has obtained a license for sailing and can check out a boat when she likes. She tells us that her collection of shells is quite nice and she will bring them back to the mainland when she returns next summer.

During her vacation this year, Lois spent five weeks traveling in the Orient. She took many pictures of Japan, Hong Kong, Cambodia, Thailand and the Philippines. Japan was most interesting to her and she would like to return to spend more time there.

Mrs. Maurice Corey, long-time resident of Nyssa, died in a local hospital on October 30, 1969.

Mrs. Corey was born Fannie Belle May, January 5, 1884, on a farm in Antrim County, Michigan, the youngest child of William J. and Lydia Durkee May. She was one of six children, learning early the lessons of give and take and sharing in a family.

She grew up in Michigan and was married at Bellaire to Charles Albert Eaton. Mr. and Mrs. Eaton celebrated their Golden Wedding anniversary in Williamsburg, Michigan before his death in 1954.

In 1956, John Maurice Corey, disconsolate after the death of his second wife who had been a bridesmaid at the wedding of Fannie May and Charles Eaton, could stand his loneliness no longer. He returned to Michigan and courted and won the hand in marriage of his life-long friend, Fannie Eaton.

Mr. and Mrs. Corey were married at Nyssa, Ore., November 1, 1956, and had resided here ever since. They lacked only two days of celebrating their thirteenth wedding anniversary.

Mrs. Corey was always where work was to be done, tears to be dried, and companionship to be provided. She had been a member of the Methodist Church for most of her life. Sunday school teacher, choir member, soloist, pianist, organist, dishwasher, any other type of work needed -- she served her time as all of these. She had the Past President's pin for the Ladies Aid in the former Methodist Episcopal Church, she was a charter member of and held the Past President's pin of the Woman's Society of Christian Service. Thus she had worked and been a part of the work of Methodist women from the Ladies Aid to the Women's Society of Christian Service to the work of this past year of the United Methodist Church's Women's Society of Christian Service. This is a record that few can equal, and probably no can excel.

In her earlier years in Michigan she had served as a postmistress, as a rural mail carrier, she had run a boarding house, and fed people's minds and souls as well as their bodies. Along the way she had operated a gift shop. Mrs.

Corey was always a friend to the needy and the lonely, many a young person had found friendship, strength, and new moral fiber by being in the home for a time. She was a staunchly independent person. She was always too busy in the work of the day to think of being a "has been" and dwelling on the "good old days."

Her courage and the courage of her devoted husband are both shown in the trip by air that they made to Michigan last summer, and by their both undergoing successful cataract operations quite recently. Her sight was returning rather rapidly.

Among the song titles she had listed as ones she would approve for use at her funeral was one with a most intriguing title -- "Only Remembered By What I Have Done."

She will be long remembered for the sweet self she is, and for what she has done in her busy life.

Mrs. Corey is survived by her husband, Maurice, of Nyssa, Ore.; her son, Ward Eaton of Traverse City, Mich.; her daughter, Mrs. Margaret Martinez, of Ft. Lauderdale, Florida; two step-daughters, Mrs. Dorothy Koebe, and Mrs. Faye Meder, both of Michigan; seven grandchildren; fifteen great-grandchildren; and three great-great-grandchildren.
