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Hatfield Urges Advocates To Stay Home And Work

Senator Mark O. Hatfield in a speech given Nov. 3 at Carthage College, Kenosha, Wis., urged that "people involved and concerned with peace should stay home and work in their communities rather than marching on Washington, D.C."

The Senator stated that the October 15th Moratorium was an effective and peaceful illustration of the views of a sizeable group of Americans.

"Further activities, however, should be at the grass roots level," he said, "not in massive marches and vigils. The local community has suffered from Vietnam as much if not more than the national as a whole."

"Public opinion is created within the communities of this country and necessary attention to these areas is neglected if all the activity is centered in Washington."

"To be most effective, those interested in peace should concentrate their attention on the Vietnam - frustrated local ills, and developing sentiment in their neighborhoods, rather than the more highly visible, yet less constructive activities such as the mass marches planned for Washington, November 15th."

Hatfield reminded the young people that violent protest in search of peace is hypocrisy in action.

"We sometimes speak of peace as though it is completely unrelated to peace within nations, communities, families and individuals."

"It is hypocrisy for a citizen to urge warring nations to make peace if he lives in hostility toward his neighbors -- even those supporting the war in Vietnam. It is hypocrisy to protest against violence in Vietnam by employing violent tactics at home."

"Our task," Hatfield continued, "is to reconcile man to

man, wherever we live, no matter our position. Unless we are willing to become reconciled to our neighbor, how can we expect our Government to reconcile the violent forces at work in the world."
