

4-H Youths Find Recipe For Success

The nation's 3.5 million 4-H youths have discovered a formula that works. It is: Learn-earn-serve-save. Diligent application guarantees success.

During recent county and state fairs, scores of youngsters from virtually every county received recognition from the state Cooperative Extension Service and the many business enterprises that support 4-H.

Numerous awards are offered annually. Among them are trips to the National 4-H Congress which will convene in Chicago Nov. 30 through Dec. 4 at the Conrad Hilton Hotel.

Some 1,650 boys and girls representing many different project areas have won 1969 state trip awards. They will comprise the state delegations to the congress, and will be accompanied by state 4-H leaders. Teenagers from all 50 states are expected to attend the Chicago event.

Of this group, nearly 270 will be selected for national scholarships valued at \$155,300, according to the National 4-H Service Committee. Winners will be announced during the congress.

In addition to these valued awards, 4-H sponsors provide to another group of state



champions, \$50 U.S. savings bonds, wrist watches, radios and plaques.

Safety Rules For Cook-Outs



This young scout is practicing one of the important safety "musts" for a cook-out or barbecue. She is dousing her fire completely with a bucket of water. No sparks will fly to set fire to dry wood in the vicinity. Her leader is practicing another good safety rule. To rid the grille area of insect pests, she is using an insecticide labeled "Non-Toxic to Humans and Pets." The aerosol contains pyrethrins, the only insecticide which can be labeled this way. Pyrethrins can be used outdoors or indoors, leave no dangerous residue on food or garden — and won't harm the children or pets. Just remember this safety rule: Always check the label. Make sure it says "Non-Toxic to Humans and Pets" right on the front of the can.

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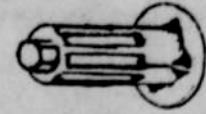
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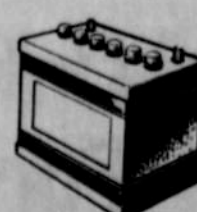

Governor McCall Named To Advisory Committee By President Nixon

President Richard Nixon today named Oregon Governor Tom McCall to the Citizens' Advisory Committee on Environmental Quality.

Appointment to the 14-member national body—chairedman by Laurence S. Rockefeller—gives McCall an influential voice in shaping White House policy for the full range of environmental issues. "Oregon's Tom McCall, with his long experience in the field, will do much toward making this vital issue visible," President Nixon said. "He is one of the strongest conservation-minded governors in the United States. Oregon has been fortunate in having a leader in the fight against air and water pollution. Now that leadership will lend great stature to this critically important national committee."

The President has summoned McCall to Washington for a Friday, November 21 meeting. The committee was formed by executive order, signed by the President last May 29, and charged with the assignment of providing environmental advice to the President and to the cabinet-level Environmental Quality Council.

McCall's background in the preservation of Oregon's natural beauty and livability extends back for many years and was the route which led him into public life.

Awards McCall has earned in the environmental field includes the Sigma Delta Chi "Outstanding TV Documentary in the United States" award given him in 1962 for his film presentation against air and water contamination, "Pollution in Paradise," and the Izaak Walton League "Golden Beaver Award" for the television documentary "Crisis in the Klamath Basin."

In a recent editorial saluting McCall's environmental accomplishments, the Pendleton East Oregonian said:

"Almost immediately upon occupying the governor's office, Tom McCall showed that he was in tune with Oregonians on livability. He understood that he could impose harsh controls on pollution and not exceed the desires of his constituents. He has provided outstanding leadership in all things associated with livability. At times it has been hard for the public

to keep up with him, but the public has never complained. "He has known what they wanted before they did. He has written a great record on a subject that has evoked almost unbelievable public concern and enthusiasm."

WHEN YOU DEFROST YOUR refrigerator, put frozen foods in a corrugated cardboard carton. If defrosting takes less than half an hour, the food will stay frozen if covered. Tests show that the temperature of the food will rise about 3.5 degrees Fahrenheit during this time. But if food is stacked on a table this temperature goes up over 7 degrees.

Automatic defrosting in combination refrigerator-freezers does not significantly raise the temperature in the freezing compartment.

These tests were made by household equipment specialists in laboratories of the U. S. Department of Agriculture.
