Senator Packwood Urges Land Reform

Oregon Senator Bob Packwood has long been an advocate of land reform in South Vietnam. He believes that such reform would stabilize the South Vietnamese government and "give the tenant farmer a piece of the action."

Toward the end, Packwood is co-sponsoring a resolution in the Senate which "recommends, urges and supports the immediate formulation and implementation by the Government of South Vietnam of a broad-based, effective, and equitable land reform program for South Vietnam."

In announcing his support for the resolution, Packwood said: "This proposal has my unqualified backing because I am convinced that the implementation of an effective land reform program would greatly enhance the stability of the South Vietnamese government."

"I believe that land reform, aside from being the right thing to do, would substantially hasten the termination of armed conflict and the tragic loss of life being suffered by all parties in the conflict."

Nurses Receive Advance Rank

The Department of the Army has reemphasized their promotion program for newly commissioned nurses. The program relies primarily on professional education and experience in determining the rank a new Army nurse will be awarded on entering active duty.

As an example, under the former program, registered nurses with a Bachelor of Science degree in nursing entered the service as second lieutenants. Now they may qualify as first lieutenants.

The new qualification system gives additional credit to professional nurses with advanced degrees and broad nursing experience and makes it possible for them to be commissioned as captains or majors.

Qualification for a commission in the Army Nurse Corps include being a registered nurse, male or female, between 20 and 33 years of age, single or married and in good physical condition. Each applicant's qualifications, education and experience are reviewed by the Surgeon General's Office where a final determination is made on eligibility and rank when commissioned.

Complete details on the new Army Nurse Corps commissioning program can be obtained from Sergeant Robert E. Hall, local Army recruiter. His office is located at 67 SW Second Ave., Ontario.
