STATE FORESTRY DEPARTMENT SELLS OUT ON NEW TREES

Almost all of the State's tree nursery stock of more than five million seedlings has already been sold out according to Conservation Director Jack Hann.

In what Hann described as an "unprecedented demand" orders flooded the office and trees of all species sold as fast as the staff could process the requests.

"Several years ago we had to plow trees of several species under at the end of the season because no one would buy them," Hann said. "This year people are buying everything we have and demanding more."

The Department was unable to fill quite a few orders, particularly for the more popular species, even though a quota was placed on order sizes to make the stock go further. "Part of the problem is that we can't adjust our next year's

supply based on this year's demand. It takes two years to produce a saleable Douglas fir seedling and the true firs as well as some other species are sold as three-year old stock," he explained. "Three years ago we had no idea the demand would be what it is."

This year there were about 5,028,000 seedlings available for sale to the public. Next year Hann estimates there will be about 9,428,000 seedlings although he says there was demand for that many this year.

Trees still currently available include shore pine, incense cedar, Russian olive, caragana and caskara.

More people than ever before are growing Christmas trees, accounting for part of the demand increase, Hann says, but he also attributes much of it to a growing public awareness of the need for conservation.

OSC OPEN HOUSE PLANNED FOR HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS
