POTATO AND ONION 4-H CLUB TO BE ORGANIZED SOON

The Malheur County Extension office of Ontario, Oregon is in the process of establishing a potato and onion 4-H club. Warren Henninger, Malheur County Potato and Onion Extension Specialist, is initiating the formation of this club.

Henninger states that this Idaho-Oregon District's potato and onion industry is large and is progressive. This area onions are shipped all across the United States and there are many markets that have not even been touched. At the present time, this Idaho-Oregon District produces about 20% of all the late summer onions produced in the United States.

Henninger said, "This area has a great potential in both the potato and the onion industry. Now, what is needed are young people who are interested in working in the field of agriculture. Many young people are losing interest in farming and for good reasons. We, as growers and

people involved in the potato and onion industry, need to inform our young people as to what agriculture has to offer and to educate them in this field."

This potato and onion 4-H club will involve members who can have potato or onion projects or who can conduct various educational programs such as insect, fertility, marketing, or production surveys.

Army Issues

Appeal To Student Nurses

To encourage young people to enter the nursing profession, the Army has reemphasized the Army Student Nurse Program.

In a school offering a nursing degree students are eligible to receive up to two years of financial assistance. This assistance includes a monthly salary, a board and room allowance, full tuition, books and incidental expenses, medical and dental care, military shopping privileges and thirty day of paid annual vacation.

After completion of college the nurse will serve in the Army Nurse Corps as a commissioned officer for two or three years, depending upon the amount of assistance received as a student.

The nurse is commissioned a second lieutenant upon entering the Army and within a year is promoted to a first lieutenant.

As a member of the Army, the nurse may complete "in-service" courses ranging from anesthesia to hospital administration. Qualified members of the Army Nurse Corps are selected for full-time attendance at colleges to attain advanced degrees.

MAN - HIS ARTS AND IDEAS

It was an attractive and even courageous idea on the part of John Canaday, the combative and amusing critic of The New York Times, to have chosen the title of Vasari's famous history of Italian painting for his own four volumes (LIVES OF THE PAINTERS). It immediately makes us realize that his aim has not been to write a history of art, subdivided into styles and movements but to present a series of profiles, long and short, of the main artists who have worked in Europe and the United States from the time of Giotto and Duccio down to Cezanne and Eakins.

The publication of this work is timely for, although our era is one that prides itself on its interest in art and has produced innumerable books about painting, few publications provide the general reader with a lively account of artists and in a way that their characters, both personal and artistic, can be grasped. It is easy enough to turn up information about a Rembrandt or a Cezanne but much less so when it comes to minor figures.

Canaday's experience as a journalist has enabled him to compress information and to bring out the main points in a sprightly manner. His task was a difficult one for he has not only been required to read widely but, what is more essential, to engage in extensive picture-gazing. His text makes clear that pictures mean much to him and that he is never willing to abandon his own views in favor of fashionable ones.

Mr. Canaday makes no secret of his opinions and it is fascinating to discover that he is such a lover of early Italian art, a period favored by your reviewer. It is by no means easy to find something fresh to say about the painting of this school, but the fact that it is more or less out of popular favor gives the author an added zest when writing about it.

One of the most interesting aspects of the last portion of the book is the emphasis placed on 19th-century American art. The time is now when an American art writer felt any need to apologize for the national school, and it is increasingly evident that American painting from this period was both interesting and of a high technical competence.

This Canaday study of art (which includes a volume of illustrations) testifies to the continued need for interpreters who can make their points simply and without affectation. If you are interested in works of art and desire to read a fascinating, very readable study, be sure to ask for this work. It should prove most rewarding. Two general books dealing with a survey of art (Janson: HISTORY OF ART and Combrink: STORY OF ART) are currently on the shelves of Nyssa Public Library.
