Following refreshments, the group enjoyed a "sing-spiration". The evenings activities were closed with a prayer by Rev. Manley.

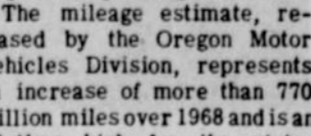
## MILEAGE UP ON OREGON HIGHWAYS

More than 12 billion 808 million miles were traveled on Oregon streets and highways during 1969, according to mileage estimates based on sales of gasoline gallonage.

The mileage estimate, released by the Oregon Motor Vehicles Division, represents an increase of more than 770 million miles over 1968 and is an all-time high for the state.

The agency said the state's mileage death rate for 1969--the number of people killed in each 100 million miles traveled--was 5.5, compared with a death rate of 5.4 in 1968.

On a mile for mile basis, the most dangerous period of the year was October through December when the death rate was 6.5. The death rate was lowest, 4.9, during the months of greatest travel, July through September.
