**U. S. Senate Survey**

An interesting study came to our attention this week, showing the standing of each U.S. Senator on issues on which the Administration has taken a position and compared Senate votes with it. The study was made by Professor Clem of the University of South Dakota.

The interesting thing about it is the poles apart stand that our senators from Oregon, and for that matter Idaho, have taken. Senator Bob Packwood had supported the President 82 per cent of the time on these issues, and ranks right near the top of the Senate.

On the other hand Senator Mark Hatfield has supported the President on only 60 per cent of these issues, and Senator Cook of Kentucky is the only Republican Senator with a poorer record. Packwood ranks 9th in support, Hatfield is 59th. Idaho's Senator Jordan has been in agreement with the President 73 per cent of the time, while Senator Church is almost at the bottom, ranking 85, and with 53 per cent agreements. Incidentally, Senator McCarthy of Minnesota is at the bottom of the heap. He not only doesn't support the President, but he apparently doesn't bother to attend most of the Senate sessions. Senator Bennett of Utah ranks number one.

Statistics such as these are perhaps not too significant and we certainly don't want to send senators and representatives to Congress who are rubber stamps for this administration, or any other. However, when our two Republican Senators seem to be so far apart, one of them isn't representing the wishes of the majority of the citizens of Oregon, and we suspect that person is Senator Hatfield.

In periods such as this, when there is so much concern for our National well-being, it would seem that the least we could expect would be that our representatives in Congress would support the President of the United States in his attempt to end this war in Indo-China, but that they would also represent the wishes of the majority of the citizens who sent them back there.

I, as a person, a member of "The Peace Generation", have lost all communication with my generation. It seems that they lack the ability to, "Practice what they preach".

I wish to relay the following. How can one speak of peace, while at the same moment he huris rocks at government officials, burns down his own college facilities and violently refuses to attend classes.

Right now I sit in the War Zone, although I will be the first to admit that Cam Ranh Bay is not at all an active spot in the war, and though I am not myself in the field, I meet people everyday, who have been. From these individuals I have learned that even though some do not believe in violence, they realize what must be done and they are doing it. Most are here to fulfill an obligation that they have accepted like the men that they are.

I myself despise war and I am ashamed at what some of my fellow countrymen have done, but I also look at what has been done to Americans by the Viet Cong. I can see where much has been in revenge for a lost buddy. Even as I write this now I can hear it said that the Viet Cong have lost buddies whose deaths they feel they must avenge. I also realize that revenge has no end, but still the demonstrators say for us to stop. I wish it were all that simple.

I ask these people, and as I ask I realize some have seen what I ask. Have you ever seen a friend shot in half as you stand next to him, or have you ever stood by while your buddy slowly bled to death and you couldn't do a thing to stop it? Think about all such things please.

I was saddened and shocked when I read about the students killed at Kent, but again I can't blame the National Guardsmen for their actions, for they were fired upon and self preservation is an instinct to all men.

I realize that I am just one very small voice of millions but I plead with all Americans to re-unite and work toward peace in a realistic way.
