Flag Day is Sunday, June 14. This is the day when we pay honor and respect to our country's flag.

President Nixon, in a special proclamation, proclaimed Flag Day June 14, and the start of National Flag Week. He said "We honor the flag for what it is and for what it demands of us. It symbolizes the dignity of man as it did when those early Americans created it." He asked that we fly the flag proudly from our home and businesses all during the week.

We in Nyssa are in good position to carry out these wishes, thanks to the Nyssa Junior Chamber of Commerce and the Nyssa Lions Club. The Jaycees place the large flags on Main Street on every patriotic occasion, and the Lions Club last year sold several hundred flags to homeowners. We challenge any community in the United States to make a better, more impressive display of patriotism on these appropriate occasions.

No nation has achieved the greatness of our own America whose flag has flown proudly and grandly these many years as a symbol of a free people. This is the flag that has carried us through periods of war and depression, the same symbol that guarantees us our rights under our Constitution, the same symbol that supports the Bill of Rights and the rights of the individual to seek his own destiny. It is a constant reminder of the price that we have paid for freedom and the prosperity that we enjoy today.

Woodrow Wilson said in 1912: "I cannot look upon the flag without imagining that it consists of alternate stripes of parchment, upon which are written the fundamental rights of man, alternating with the streams of blood by which those rights have been vindicated and validated."

Five years later Theodore Roosevelt wrote in 1917: "We can have no 'fifty-fifty' allegiance in this country. Either a man is an American and nothing else, or he is not an American at all. We are akin in blood and descent to most of the nations of Europe; but we are separate from all of them; and we are bound always to give our whole-hearted and undivided loyalty to our own flag, and in any international crisis to treat each and every foreign nation purely according to its conduct in that crisis."

Over the years, the American flag continues to have profound meaning for most Americans. When we celebrate Flag Day on June 14 let us pay homage to the flag of freedom. Let's fly it proudly!
