

Union Man Named Father Of The Year

The 1970 Oregon Father of the Year is an agricultural researcher at Oregon State University's Experiment Station in Union County and also a professor at Eastern Oregon College in La Grande. His name is Vance Pumphrey, who is 48 years old and a resident of Union, Oregon. Mr. Pumphrey and his wife Niola have one son, Keith, who is a student at Washington State University in the School of Veterinary Medicine.

The Father of the Year program is a state-wide activity sponsored each year by the Oregon beef industry to coincide with Father's Day which is Sunday, June 21. The Oregon CowBelles, an auxiliary of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association, are responsible for the nominations from 36 counties and for the final selection. More than 100 entries were submitted this year from counties throughout Oregon. This year's "Father" receives an all-expense paid trip for himself and his family; a suite of rooms at the Imperial Hotel; \$100 in Beef Gift Certificates and a very special "Father of the Year" trophy. Mr. Pumphrey's name was submitted to this year's committee by the Union County Boy Scout Troop 585.

Qualifications which go into the selection of the Father of the Year include his performance as a father and a husband; his activities in civic and community affairs as well as his contribution to youth programs. Mr. Pumphrey stated that he "believes that the strength of the nation is in the home and has a home which supports this belief."

The various community organizations and projects in which he participates include: 4-H leadership; a coach for the 4-H crop and weed judging team from Union County - his teams have won 9 consecutive state championships. He helped organize and instructs community hunter-safety programs. He has been active as an executive committee member of the Boy Scouts; School Board member, Commercial Club and Blood Bank. He personally has donated 14 pints of blood. Recently, he received an honorary life membership in the Future Farmers of America for services contributed.

Mr. Pumphrey is also active in church activities. For years he has served on the Board of Trustees of the Methodist Church in Union. He is a charter member of the Methodist Men's Club and is active on most of the special church committees.

Mr. Pumphrey also stated that "all children need guidance during their formative years if they are going to grow into useful and valuable citizens."

The 1970 "Father" is highly respected in his field of agricultural research. He has been elected to three national honorary societies. He was born in Nebraska in 1922 received a Bachelor of Science and a Master of Science degree from the University of Nebraska.

HATFIELD URGES PROMPT ACTION ON HOME FINANCE ACT

Citing the stagnant conditions in Oregon's home-building industry and the dormant situation in the entire field of forest products, Senator Mark O. Hatfield urged prompt consideration of the House version of the Emergency Home Financing Act of 1970 by the House Rules Committee in a letter to Chairman William M. Colmer.

Oregon is suffering severe economic hardships as a result of the slowdown in the home construction industry," Hatfield said.

"With the lumber industry as the backbone of our economy, the ramifications of this slowdown echo in all segments of the economy of my State.

"Implementation of this bill would move us toward our national goal of decent houses for all Americans while giving Oregon's economy a needed boost.

"The bill covers several areas of home financing," said Hatfield, "and certainly would help Oregon. It is no panacea, but is a step toward easing our housing shortage and stimulating new home construction."

The bill, H.R. 17495, passed the House Banking Committee recently, but no action has been taken by the Rules Committee which sends legislation to the House for floor action.

Hatfield fears that "further delay will reduce its impact in 1970, when we need it most in Oregon."

1970 Big Game Regulations In Effect July 1

The Oregon Game Commission reminded hunters that the big game regulations adopted by the Commission recently will become effective July 1, 1970 and will remain in force through June 30, 1971.

This reminder is issued to advise hunters that on July 1 the black bear will receive protection statewide and may not be taken except during authorized seasons. Presently the black bear is protected only in national forests, several southwestern units, along the Rogue River, and in two game management areas.

The regulations booklet is expected to be available for distribution in early July.

JUVENILE FIREARMS SAFETY CLASSES NOW GOING

The Oregon Game Commission, along with hunter safety instructors throughout the state, today reminded youngsters that they should be thinking seriously about enrolling in a course in the safe handling of firearms if they intend to be in the field hunting this fall.

Oregon law makes it mandatory for a young hunter through the age of 17 years to have in possession a hunter safety certificate to hunt with firearms on land other than his own premises. To obtain this certificate the young hunter must first pass a course in the safe handling of firearms.

These courses are available through local sportsmen's groups, civic organizations, and in schools in some areas. The certificate is issued by the Game Commission following successful completion of the course.

Youngsters should enroll as early as possible so they may receive the certificate well in

advance of the hunting season. Once the hunting seasons are underway, most classes will end since the instructors are also hunters who will themselves be out in the field. It is almost impossible for youngsters to get this valuable training once the hunting season starts.

Oregon's hunter safety training program, under the direction of the Game Commission and assisted by more than 3,000 volunteer instructors, has received national recognition during the 12 years it has been in existence. During this period the state has received two Certificates of Merit from the National Rifle Association and has also received the Association's National Award in excellence in the training of juvenile hunters.

Young boys and girls should inquire locally about hunter safety classes to be held in their area. Parents are also urged to attend these classes along with their youngsters.
