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24th Annual Nyssa Rodeo To Be Held This Weekend

140 Cowboys Registered For All Events

A total of 140 cowboys are registered for the 24th annual Nyssa Nite Rodeo to be held Friday and Saturday nights, according to rodeo chairman Alvin Allen. Sponsored by the Nyssa Jaycees, the rodeo is gaining a reputation for being one of the best staged, fastest shows in the valley.

The cowboys will be competing for \$3,700 in prize money on stock furnished by Jake Pope of the Spur Rowel Rodeo Company, Twin Falls, Idaho. The well-known stock producers will furnish judges, timers, pick-up men, clown and bull fighters.

PARADE INFORMATION
Co-chairmen of the parade are Don Bowers and Chad Olsen. Riding groups in the parade include the Eh Capa Riders, Boise; the Payette County

Posse and the Payette County Posse-ettes; Malheur County Sheriff's Posse; 4-H Comancheros Riding Club; and the Old Fort Boise Riders, Parma. In addition will be many individual entries in several different categories.

The parade will form on Main Street near the Snake River Bridge at 7 p.m. both nights, and will start promptly at 7:30, proceeding up Main Street to 7th Street, south to King Avenue, and then to the rodeo grounds. The summer bands of Nyssa and Adrian will march in the parade, one each night, and play the national anthem at the start of the rodeo.

All parade entrants, both nights, will be admitted to the rodeo free. There is no charge for children under 12 when accompanied by parents. Admission for adults is \$2.00, and \$1.00 for students ages 12 through high school, and this is for grandstand seating.

Competition in the six main events is in saddle bronc riding, bareback riding, calf roping, bull riding, team roping and barrel racing.

Kids under 12 years of age will compete each night in calf roping. They must be accompanied by their parents, who

must sign for them.

Featured attraction both nights will be the Eh Capa Bareback riders from Boise. The group consists of about 40 young riders who have performed at large rodeos all over the West, including Cheyenne Frontier Days, Nampa Stampede, and many others. The group is led by Wayne Stear, drill master, and are dressed in colorful Indian garb.

The Nyssa Jaycees have been busy preparing for the big event, which will get underway promptly at 8:15 each evening. The grounds will be watered and sprayed for mosquitoes before rodeo time. Chemicals are being donated again by the J.R. Simplot Company.

Plan to bring the family and see a good rodeo. Chairman Allen promises that this will be one of the best, with excellent stock and some of the West's best cowboys on hand to insure a fine show.

Preceding the rodeo on Thursday, Friday and Saturday the Vigilantes will be out in force to see that everyone is wearing Western garb, and shaving permits must be produced by those not growing beards. Winners of the beard growing contest will be announced Friday night.

New President Of OSU To Visit Eastern Oregon

Dr. Robert W. MacVicar, new President of Oregon State University will be in Malheur county next Monday, July 13, to meet local people and to get acquainted with this area of eastern Oregon.

People of this vicinity are invited to attend the special lunch meeting of the Ontario Chamber of Commerce at which Dr. MacVicar will speak informally at the East Side Cafe at 12:00. A question and answer period will be included.

Tickets for the luncheon are available at the Ontario Chamber of Commerce office in the Moore Hotel and at the County Extension office in the Ontario City Hall. Persons planning to attend are urged to call either office to make arrangements for tickets.

Dr. MacVicar's swing through central and eastern Oregon will include his first public appearances since he succeeded Acting President Roy A. Young as Oregon State's top man on July 1.

Dr. MacVicar came to OSU from Southern Illinois University, a state university of 23,000 students, where he was chancellor and former vice president for academic affairs for six years.

He has a solid background in the traditions and educational

philosophies of Land-Grant universities such as Oregon State. An honor graduate of Wyoming, he received his masters from Oklahoma State and his Ph.D. from Wisconsin.

Dr. MacVicar has said that the opportunity to return to and direct Land-Grant university, with its historic commitment to statewide public service programs such as agricultural extension, is one of the reasons he was interested in the OSU position.

Dr. MacVicar is a biochemist by training. He was born in Princeton, Minn., September 28, 1918. He completed his high school education at Saratoga, Wyo., in 1935.

He served three years in the Sanitary Corps as a food and nutrition expert in World War II and was discharged in 1945 with the rank of major. He is a colonel in the Army Medical Corps Reserve.

TVCC Sponsors Education Workshop

Twenty two participants selected from Oregon Community Colleges and other educational agencies responsible for adult basic education are involved in a two week workshop at Treasure Valley Community College.

The program got underway on July 6, with a presentation on programmed instruction by Dr. Rex Reynolds, University of Chicago. He is director of the workshop with sponsorship jointly shared by TVCC; Oregon Board of Education; and Oregon State University.

Hearing On Minam River Wilderness Bill July 27

Senator Mark O. Hatfield said today that a hearing on the proposed Minam River Wilderness bill has been scheduled for La Grande on Monday, July 27. Provisions of the bill (S1142) call for addition of 100,000 acres to the Eagle Cap Wilderness Area.

Hatfield said there is a possibility that the bill in final form will call for fewer acres to be added.

He said that "all alternatives are being carefully studied." According to Hatfield, the procedures, hour and place for the hearing will be scheduled in the near future. "This hearing will provide an excellent opportunity for all those interested in the proposal to appear and be heard on a matter that is of concern to all Oregonians," Hatfield said.
