

VANDALS DESTROY CHINOOK SALMON

Vandals have been at it again. The willful destruction this time was the thievery of adult spring chinook salmon, which had just been captured by Game Commission personnel for eggtaking purposes, and the butchering of more fish that the vandals could not get.

The destruction took place at the Commission's new brood fish holding pond at Soda Springs on the upper Umpqua. The big adult springers are held in this deep pool all summer, then stripped of eggs in the fall when the fish are fully ripened. These fish are extremely valuable since the offspring as returning adult salmon form well over 50 percent of the Umpqua spring chinook run. Fifty-two adult females and ten males previously captured at the Winchester Dam fish ladder were in the pond.

The poachers entered the area at night and speared or snagged 12 of the big adults. Several others received deep wounds from the snagging gear used and it appears that at least ten more will be lost, the result of delayed mortality from rips and gashes in their bodies. The Commission hopes that anyone who has knowledge of this incident will come forward with the information.
