### Fall Big Game Seasons Fast Approaching

The Oregon Game Commission today reminded hunters that the fall big game seasons are approaching fast, with the antelope season less than one month away, followed quickly by the archery seasons, several agricultural area deer seasons, and the High Cascade Buck Season.

The reminder isn't critical to hunters who seek only buck deer or bull elk. However, hunters interested in special tags or permits which are issued on a drawing basis should file applications immediately.

Time is short, the Commission advised, if hunters want to be included in the drawings for antelope, bighorn sheep, and the August deer permit seasons. Deadline for filing applications for these special hunts is July 21. The drawing to determine successful applicants is set for July 31.

Applications must be in at the Commission's Portland headquarters by 5 p.m. on the deadline date to be included in the drawings. Late applications will not be considered unless surplus tags or permits remain following the drawings.

It is highly doubtful that surplus tags will remain for bighorn sheep and antelope as these hunts are always well oversubscribed. Also, with the shortage of antlerless deer permits this year it is also likely that all deer permit seasons, including the agricultural hunts, will be well oversubscribed.

Hunters interested in the regular deer season antlerless permits and November permit seasons have a little more time to file as the deadline is set for August 11. Deadline for elk permits and cougar tags is August 25.

### WORKSHOP SET FOR VALE JULY 24

An all-day disaster preparedness workshop for local government officials and key citizens will be held in Vale July 24.

The program, conducted for Malheur county officials by the Division of Continuing Education, will be held at the Starhome Cafe from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Purpose of the workshop, according to County Coordinator Richard Scott, is to provide an opportunity for workshop participants to examine the county's current disaster readiness posture. Discussion of operational problems that could confront Malheur county during a disaster and consideration of actions to be taken to improve disaster readiness capabilities will also be undertaken at the workshop, Scott said.

The Vale workshop is the third of four similar disaster preparedness workshops to be conducted in selected counties in Oregon this year.

Nyssa held Fruitland to 4 runs on 7 hits while making 10 runs on 12 hits and playing errorless ball. Bill Ulrey was the winning pitcher, although relieved by Ross Fox in the 6th inning.

Leading the hitters was Kent Holcomb, with a double and two singles. Ross Fox, Joe Joyce, and Larry Woods each hit two singles, and Gary Sparks, Bill Marcum and Bill Ulrey each had one hit to help their team to victory.

The championship game was Saturday, July 11, with Nyssa winning over Ontario Team No. 11, 14 to 4. The game was called after 5 innings because Nyssa had a 10 run lead.

Billy Marcum was again winning pitcher, and allowed only 4 runs on 7 hits. Nyssa scored their 14 runs on 13 hits and 10 walks.

Kent Holcomb, Joe Joyce and Bill Ulrey each had 3 hits, Neal Oldemeyer made 2 hits, and Ross Fox and Scott Holcomb each had one hit.

Immediately after the game the team presented their coach, Rodney Holcomb, and assistant coach, Lloyd Woods, with gifts and baseballs autographed by team members. The team also presented autographed baseballs to Kent Holcomb, and Ross Fox, who are moving out of the area.

### HIGH LAKES GET TROUT PLANT

The annual aerial stocking of trout into high lakes in the Cascades and Wallowa Mountains is set to begin July 13, according to Reino Koski, Game Commission fishery biologist who heads the fish liberation program. If flying weather cooperates, Koski expects the aerial fish drops will be completed by July 21.

Flight operations will begin at the Klamath Falls airfield for planting lakes in the south Cascades and then be transferred to the Fall River airstrip for aerial drops into central and north Cascade lakes. Aerial flights in the Wallowa and Elkhorn mountains may be delayed somewhat this year as a number of lakes at high elevations remain ice-covered, the result of a late spring. When these open up, flights will originate from the Joseph and Baker airfields.

About 400 isolated lakes will be stocked this year with some 650,000 fingerling trout. The bulk of these fish are brook trout. Some lakes will be stocked with rainbows and other with cutthroats.

A tally of lakes totaling 775 high mountain lakes on the Commission's stocking list, all of which are planted by the aerial fish-drop method. Depending on angling pressure received, some lakes are stocked every year, some every two years, and others on a three or four-year cycle. Last year 425 lakes were aerial stocked with more than 525,000 trout.
