WORK SMARTER
- NOT HARDER

OVEN CANNING is dangerous. Jars are likely to explode regardless of what type of jars or lids you use. In addition, food does not get adequate heat treatment to insure safe keeping.

There are no safe canning shortcuts. Don't fall for trick canning methods such as use of aspirin for preserving fruits and vegetables.

You might be lucky for years but there may be a time when everything spoils. Always follow proper processing directions.

For complete information on safe canning, ask your county Extension office for a free bulletin, "Home Canning of Fruits and Vegetables".

Large canners or jelly kettles on the small unit of an electrical range can cause trouble. Repair men tell us these utensils restrict the air circulation and may overheat the element causing it to burn out. Also, aluminum drip pans below the unit have sometimes melted under these conditions. Use large utensils on the large unit only and help cut out your repair bills.

Picnic jugs need a little pampering to avoid giving an off taste to beverages. After use, partly fill with water and add two tablespoons of baking soda. Give it several good shakes, then empty and rinse thoroughly. Don't forget the cork. Rub with dry soda, then rinse. Allow the jug, also the cork, to air dry before closing it.

COST OF APPLIANCE service has become a favorite subject over many a cup of coffee or back fence. Automatic washers are most frequent culprits.

But from the other angle, repairmen say that from 30

to 50 per cent of all calls they make to service major appliances are unnecessary. You still have to pay for the call, even though the repairman simply points out that the hoses are kinked so that the water can't drain.

If you'd like to cut down on service costs, ask your county Extension office for a free fact sheet on "How to Avoid Unnecessary Service Calls for Laundry Appliances."

DON'T THINK YOU'RE being cheated if you find electric coffee makers and other appliances from which hot liquids are poured have shorter

cords than formerly.

This is for safety reasons. The Department of Health, Education, and Welfare says that many people have been burned by becoming entangled in long cords of these appliances. Spills result.

IF YOUNGSTERS WRITE with ballpoint pens on plastic upholstery, don't lose any time in removing the stain with a cloth dampened in alcohol. Then wipe away traces with a cloth dampened in clear water.

Ballpoint ink will permanently stain plastics if allowed to remain even a short time.
