This year's fair is scheduled from August 26-29. Entries will be received in the Armory building on Tuesday from 1-8 p.m. and Wednesday from 8:00 a.m. - 12:00 noon.

There are divisions in art at the County Fair for young and old alike. Young people under 12 years of age may enter their work in the Junior division; those twelve to seventeen years old will enter in the Intermediate division.

This year, for the first time, the adult division is being divided into beginner and advanced groups, Mrs. Conner said. The beginner is classified as a person who has painted less than three years. The advanced artist is one who is semi-schooled or who has painted for three years or more.

All art exhibits entered in the fair must be original work and all pictures, sketches and photos must be framed or matted and have picture wire attached or another means to make them ready for hanging. Following eight weeks of mandatory basic training, those enlisting as interrogation specialists are given an interim "secret" clearance and sent for seven weeks to the US Army Intelligence School at Fort Holabird, Md.

The US Army Missile and Munitions Center and School at Redstone Arsenal in Huntsville, Ala., provides enlisted personnel with a knowledge of the receipt, storage, shipment, issue, safety and security of ammunition, large rockets, guided missiles, ammunition components, military explosives and chemical ammunition. Instruction is also given in the layout and operation of ammunition installations.

School is for eleven weeks, following the mandatory eight weeks of basic training. Courses will range in scope from proper security of ammunition and other related material, detection, identification and decontamination of chemical agents to destruction methods for conventional ammunition and characteristics and physiological effects of chemical agents.
