My name is Marlo Fife, I am 17 years old, and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Dean Fife of Nyssa. All my life I have suffered from a blood deficiency known as Hipo Gamma Globulin Anemia. The only treatment for this is a substance taken from human blood. Since there is no other way to obtain this my parents were unable to help, they asked friends, neighbors and relatives to donate the special type blood needed, to the Red Cross Blood Bank.

There are people in our community who have given as much as 3 1/2 gallons of blood to help me. I have been receiving transfusions and shots since I was one month old. I don't know how much blood I have received but it has taken hundreds of pints. My parents and I would like to thank all those who have been so kind to me over the past years, and God bless you for your help. We would also like to thank Dr. Sarazin for all he has done. I urge each of you to go to the Blood Drawing August 18, so that other small children and our boys in the Service may have the chance to live and enjoy life as I do.

Herb Sez

Do you need some mental therapy? If you do, why not try the huckleberry patch? I can think of no other method, not even fishing, that can make your mind a total blank as well as the huckleberry patch.

The first thing to do is find the elusive berry in quantities large enough to make it worth while to pluck them from the bush. This year, due to the late season and the very wet spring, the huckleberry is a very lush fruit. There are lots of them and they are a first class size. Anyhow the first problem is to find the patch. This may sound easy but you can't always depend upon former patches to be as nice to work in as they were in the past so it may become necessary to comb the mountainsides. This bit of combing takes a lot of concentration. You have to find your way around and through the down trees and buck brush. Then thrill of thrills, right in front of you is a group of bushes heavy laden with the dark purple fruit. The feeling of finding a beautiful patch is akin to having a large trout getting caught on the end of the fishing line.

Well you're in the patch sitting on the hard ground or climbing up the steep hill on your knees. There are some places where you can pick in the shade but too much of the time is spent with the sun beating on your exposed back. Rare is the moment when a mosquito, yellow jacket or horse fly isn't buzzing around your head. These fancy repellents may keep them from landing but they sure worry me to death. Picking the berries is a tedious business, they must be picked one by one, good pickers can do better than that but a good picker I ain't, then they are sort of gathered in the hand till the hand gets full and you drop them in the bucket. Eventually the bottom of the bucket gets covered and after an age the bucket's half full. It takes a jillion of them to fill a gallon bucket and I've never had that pleasure because when the bucket's half full either dump it intentionally in the master bucket or unintentionally over an acre of mountain side. This is part of the therapy. Sometimes when you sit real quiet the little animals come out to work and play. The birds will sing and you feel that all's well with the world.

Did I say therapy? Well if you can remotely think of your daily problems while suffering the joys and tortures of the berry patch all I can say is, "Well my friend you're already over the hill."
