



### Chinook Salmon Return

Idaho Power Company's Circle C hatchery, where record number of returning spring Chinook salmon have been counted this year, is located in picturesque canyon beside Rapid River near Riggins. Facility, containing extensive raceways and ponds for rearing up to 3 million fingerlings, is one of four hatcheries Idaho Power has built under a broad conservation program to transfer spring Chinook and steelhead runs from the Hells Canyon reach to the Salmon River watershed. Idaho Fish and Game Dept. operates hatcheries at company expense.

### TVCC Nursing Instructors Return From Seminar

Jean Joyce, Director, Kathy Tiger and Elaine Balderson, instructors in the Practical Nursing Department, just returned from a five-day seminar at Colorado State University, Fort Collins, Colorado, co-sponsored by the University and the National Association for Practical Nurse Education and Service (NAPNES). Two seminars were held under these auspices—one on "Teaching and Learning" for practical nursing educators and the other on "Let's Break the Communications Barriers?" for licensed practical nurses. NAPNES, an organization of over 30,000 licensed practical nurses, teachers of practical nursing, and others concerned about nursing care, was founded in 1941 to promote the development of schools of practical nursing and the continuing education of licensed practical nurses. Its headquarters office is at 1465 Broadway, New York City.

### Sen. Hatfield Urges Better Laws For BLM

Citing "increasing evidences of vandalism in our parks and recreation areas," Senator Mark Hatfield urged additional authority be given to the Secretary of the Interior to deal with vandalism on Bureau of Land Management lands. His statement came at a "Public Lands Subcommittee hearing on S. 3389, where Hatfield is the ranking Republican. S. 3389 provides for penalties for violation of public land laws and for protection of public lands and their uses. "The BLM, unlike the Forest Service and Park Service, lacks quick enforcement authority," Hatfield said, "but must proceed through a United States Marshall -- hardly a practical tool even when officials observe vandals destroying government property. "Laws are on the books covering garbage dumping, motorized vehicle use, burning, littering and vandalism. Authorities need the proper tools to enforce these laws."

### Statement By Governor McCall On The John Froines Decision

On numerous occasions I stated my personal view that Dr. John Froines, while employed as a member of the faculty at the University of Oregon, has engaged in conduct which is contrary to the best interests of the system and inconsistent with his continuation as an employee.

I am informed that the State System of Higher Education finds it cannot legally take action to dismiss Dr. Froines. This decision is based on the advice of the Attorney General of Oregon, on a study of recent Federal court decisions in similar cases, and on the imprecise wording of rules for dismissal which heretofore were in effect. The board is taking action now, at my insistence, to formulate stricter and more precise rules—but these rules cannot lawfully be applied retroactively to remove Dr. Froines.

As a public official, I feel a sense of frustration. I know what should be done, but there is no legal way this can be accomplished. No one needs to remind me that when I became Governor I swore to uphold the law. I cannot do an illegal act even if I believe I am doing it for a good purpose. If I did, I would be embracing the philosophy of those radicals and anarchists who justify any means to achieve an end which they consider just.

I have asked the State Board of Higher Education to send a copy of a report, prepared by the University of Oregon's Committee of Inquiry, to each state-wide elective officer and to the members of the Oregon Legislative Assembly. I'm sure the board will make other copies available to interested persons. I urge anyone who would condemn the State System of Higher Education or other public officers for the present situation

first to read this report--which recites Dr. Froines' behavior, and also analyzes relevant Federal court cases which tie our hands in this matter.

If Dr. Froines should return to his teaching post this Fall, he is on notice that new rules of conduct will be in effect and that he must conduct himself as a responsible member of the faculty. Failing to do so, he will be subjected to immediate disciplinary action under these new rules.

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### Holy Rosary Administrator To Be Honored

Sister Mary Aloysius Newell, Administrator of Holy Rosary Hospital, will be advanced to Fellowship Status in the American College of Hospital Administrators September 13, at a convocation ceremony to be held in Houston's Astroworld Hotel.
