

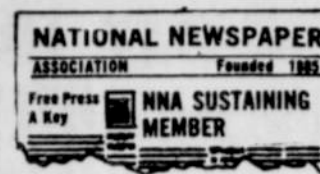

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Football Season Nears

Just a little more than two weeks away from its first football game, a season opener with Vale September 4, Nyssa High School football players will check out their pads and gear Sunday and start preparing for a long 10-game season which at this time we can look forward to with anticipation.

Coach Harry McGinley has called his first official practice for Monday. After a fairly successful season last year, the boys should have the experience and maturity to go a long way. The fact that last year's team beat Vale for the first time in 26 years made the year for most fans, but a mid-season letdown and some injuries caused the season to be just fair as far as wins and losses are concerned.

That's beside the point. The important thing is the fact that we have a good bunch of boys, well-coached, and we think they are going to give a good account of themselves.

Dave Manley, Keith Oldemeyer, Ron Moffis, Steve Ross, Scott Engstrom, Joe Bernal - this looks like one of the best backfields in the valley, and this is to name only a few.

Lassiter, Belveal, Cannon, Chester, Perdue, Reece, Smith, Gibson, Cleaver, Feik, Moore - just a few of the linemen who have had experience and are ready to do battle. Add to this some of last year's frosh-sophs who are anxious to win a regular berth on the varsity, and we should see quite a team.

We will be on hand rooting for the team, and we predict that the support will be great from all the Nyssa fans. All we expect from the boys is that they do their best, and we think their best just might be pretty good.

ARMY NEEDS COMMUNICATIONS EXPERTS

A fighting force must maintain contact within its various units and outside its own command in order to function effectively. No army has long survived without keeping its lines of communication intact.

The result is that the radio has assumed a position of vital importance in today's modern Army. Because of its complexity, specially trained men are needed to install, operate and perform corrective maintenance on field radio relay and related equipment.

Following eight weeks of basic training, fourteen weeks of instruction are given at the U.S. Army Southeastern Signal School at Fort Gordon, Ga. to the young man who enlists for this option. It is both intense and thorough. Basic carrier telephone and telegraph systems, radio relay antenna and generators, medium capacity multiplex systems, and communication concepts are a few of the many subjects covered.

An interest in electronics and a standard score of 100 or higher in the electronics aptitude area are two of the prerequisites of needed for training as a Radio Relay and Carrier Attendant.

For further information on this and any other of a number of fields open to young men and women in today's modern Army, see Sgt. Matthews at Ontario. His hours are from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, and from 9 a.m. to 12 a.m. on Saturdays.

Wayne Wardwell of Kirkpatrick Memorial Presbyterian Church and the Rev. Stanley Banks of Parma. Interment was at Canyon Hill, Caldwell.
