**OREGON ECONOMY MAY MOVE AHEAD**

There are indications that Oregon's economy may start moving upward ahead of the national trend, Dr. Edward W. Reed, vice president and economist for the United States National Bank of Oregon, said in the recent issue of the "Oregon Business Barometer" published quarterly by the bank.

The reason for this, according to Dr. Reed, is the recent activity in the housing sector, and developments that will contribute for a further increase. He said that housing starts have recently inched upward, that building permits throughout the nation have strengthened since March, and that the flow of funds into savings institutions has increased.

Although lumber and plywood production failed to "turn around" in the second quarter, there was some improvement in July, and June figures for employment in logging and sawmills showed slight increases.

For the state as a whole, business activity continued to decline during the second quarter. The U.S. Bank's index of activity dropped to an estimated 170.2 in June, down from a high of 178.7 in November, 1969. When compared to nationwide trends, the drop in Oregon has occurred over a shorter period of time and has been slightly steeper.

A bright spot in agriculture, which not only posted gains during the first half of 1970, but five percent gain for the year of normal weather and harvest conditions prevail.

**Ten School Districts In Oregon Need Approval Of Budgets To Operate**

School bells may not ring this September for 50,000 Oregon youngsters because of a lack of funds to operate 10 Oregon school districts.

Voters will have another chance before September 1 in seven of the 10 districts to approve budgets.

Prineville has scheduled a vote for early September, Junction City, September 3, and Sweet Home, September 1.

Commenting on the possible school closures, OEA President Bruce Stewart said, "It is unfortunate that kids and quality education must suffer because of the voter's general frustration over taxes, the economy and the Viet Nam War."

"There is something very wrong when school districts in a

prosperous state such as Oregon are allowed to go bankrupt and close their doors," Stewart said.

Over 2,700 Oregon Teachers are affected by the current school crisis. "We anticipate teachers who have signed contracts will not be able to receive salaries. In that event the OEA is prepared to make interest free loans to any of our members who might find themselves without funds to meet their living expenses," Stewart added.

The OEA President emphasized, "Professional educators want to make it clear to the public that there is no Santa Claus to fund schools from the state or the federal level. Governmental agencies in Salem

and Washington, D.C., offer no hope for local districts who lack funds to operate schools."

A partial answer to Oregon's school finance crisis will be offered to the voters November 3. Ballot Measure #10, if approved, would up date and establish modern tax bases in all Oregon schools. Presently 80 per cent of Oregon's 350 school districts have no tax base.

"Passage of Ballot Measure #10 will assure schools opening each year, thus eliminating the present outmoded system. However, the measure offers only a partial answer to the finance problem," Stewart said.

"Solutions need to be found to increase schools funds from the state and federal level. Schools have relied too long on the local property tax as the principle source of revenue," Stewart emphasized.

"During the months ahead OEA will be working with state and federal officials to correct the current over-balance in school finance," Stewart added.
